DUFFY'S LETTER TO DANIEL O'CONNELL.

RATHMINES, Oct. 18th, 1814. My DEAR Sin .- As you state in your late important letter to the association that you are at present balancing the respective merits of Repeal and Federalism, I am anxious to throw a few thoughts on the subject loosely before you. If I were still of the association, I would do so there; as I am not I prefer the familiar medium of a letter to the less kindly and respectful one of a newsnaper article, I learned, during the three happy months I spent in Richmond, how considerate you can be of adverse opinions-how courteously you treat and how candidly you weigh thema circumstance which I would be equally unwilling to forget or abuse.
