

FIVE DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE PACIFIC MAIL.

The Packet Ship Oxford, Capt. Hathorne, arrived at New York on Monday night, with five days later news from Europe.

The intelligence is of very little consequence. We annex a summary of the most important events, for which we are indebted to the New York Herald, of Tuesday morning.

A grand dinner was given by the merchants of London to Sir Henry Patterson, on the 11th of December. Several Cabinet Ministers, and many other distinguished persons, were present in all about 2000 guests.

The Morning Advertiser states that there are eighteen or twenty steam Presses in the House of Commons, ready to meet each other, and the week following the merchants of Bristol, on which place Sir Henry is a native, pay a similar compliment to him.

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The accounts from the frontiers of Poland state that it was in consequence of communications from England that forty Polish soldiers were recently arrested, on a charge of being concerned in a conspiracy against the government.

Letters from Italy state that the continued stocks of exchequer which, for more than a year past, the city of Naples has been disturbed, have ceased to show alarm, and that it is in contemplation to evacuate the well-known place, and build a new Regency on some better protected spot of the Maritime shore.

Travelers arrived at Constantinople about Nov. 20, from Persia, report the arrival of Dr. Wolf at Meshed, in safety, although he had not yet reached Tehran.

The Bank of England have given notice that they will reduce money on approved bills of exchange at 24 per cent.

The "GRAND BRITAIN" STEAM SHIP.—This five-year-old vessel is under way for her first trip. At six o'clock on Thursday morning the steam was set up, and shortly before 12 o'clock she started on her voyage, the engines at first making but 6 revolutions per minute, which gave a speed of about 4 knots.

General Espinosa.—We understand that the Duke of Victoria (General Espinosa) has been suffering from indisposition at Abbey-bodge, Regent's-park, the residence the General has acquired since he vacated his apartments at Mincing's Hotel. On Saturday week he was very unwell, his physicians attributing his illness to the inclemency of the weather, and to the cold which he caught in the General was daily out with Colonel Guera, accompanied by the Duchess and her niece, who share his exile.

The Weather in London.—The weather, which has been so disagreeable since the 1st of October, has become more moderate, and is now in a more favorable state than it has been for some time past.

The Fines in London.—During the past week in consequence of the severe frost, the parks have been crowded with skaters, sleds, and pedestrians. On the 1st of January, the Queen, Prince Albert, Sir R. Peel, the Duke of Devonshire, and Brougham, &c. Some superb yachts were sent to the Queen are valued at £10,000.

IRELAND.

FIGHTING MURDERS AND OUTRAGES.—Fighting murders disgrace Ireland. A Protestant family named Shepard had taken a farm of M. Fawcett, near Ballyowen in King's county, from which a Roman Catholic family named Daly had been ejected.

The Chinese in Canton continued to be very riotously disposed. There were five French vessels of war at Canton. The French Minister was negotiating a treaty.

The Chinese in Canton seem to hate "outside outsiders" most cordially. They have been fighting with the British and American ships of war at the river; they have also a large and a large mercantile fleet at Whampoa, who will probably be quite able to protect our countrymen.

The Chinese Government sends its worst criminals, and among them not a few princes of the blood, to the Hakkian or Annam river, in the confines of the eastern part of Russia, a Siberia, where the exiles are exposed to the severest hardships, and whilst hunting for the animals, are often left to starve in the howling desert.

The Governor of Cheekang has duly represented the meritorious deeds of the gentry under his immediate jurisdiction, for rebuilding a city, by their subscription. The claims upon government are now so numerous, that if all the Mandarins of the Empire were to die within one year, the candidates for office who have paid in advance could not all see their hopes realized.

Some Revenue officers in the Tanchoo department, were unable to make up the deficit of their receipts, and to make a severe example, in order to deter others from following their example, they were doomed to transportation.

A long list of outrages, varying in degrees of atrocity, are announced as having occurred in the neighborhood of Limerick and Nenagh. A faction fight took place, the other day, in the churchyard of Ballydoon, in the south of Ireland; a large number of infuriated men were fighting over a corpse which had been brought to the churchyard for interment.

The two parties had fought on a farm or meadow, but had been put to flight by the police before much mischief was done; in the churchyard they battled till one man was taken away insensible, and many others had received severe injuries.

Mr. Samuel McKim was shot in his own house, near Sligo, on the 3rd instant, by some person who fired through the window; motive unknown. Patrick Curran, a substantial farmer, was risen from a chair at the fire side of his house, at Garneen, near Clara, when he was in a like manner wounded in the arm,

shoulder, and breast, by a bullet and some shrapnel. On the 3rd, James Murray and John Kennedy, brothers-in-law, quarrelled about some land which they held jointly; there was a conflict among their friends, and Murray received a mortal blow, of which he died on the 5th. An armed party entered the house of Joseph Burke, at Douras, in King's County, on Sunday, during the man's absence, fired shots over the head of his wife, destroyed some wheat, hay, and agricultural implements, and left word that Burke had better prepare his coffin; he is heard to Mr. Blackett, who lately took some land from his tenants, making them compensation in money. William Shea, an old man, was killed with a stone by his son Michael, at Kilvernon, near Callan, because he was spreading some seed-wheat for a sick son-in-law, with whom Michael had quarrelled.

SPAIN.

The interest of the fortnight centres in Spain, where, as usual, all looks gloomy and threatening. Zubizarro has not yet been discovered in his hiding place, but two of his sons have been put to death. The atrocities which the military dictator who now usurps Spain, indulges in, sickens the mind—yet the nation stirs not.

We have reviewed the Madrid Journals and correspondence of the 8th inst. The Ministers of France were actively engaged in preparing the budget, and in the course of the week, El Tiempo says that he will present at the same time the new tributary system, that the property tax is to be increased, &c. and that by that means the Minister expects to provide funds for the maintenance of the army.

Sixty inhabitants of Barcelona had been transported to Castagna, in consequence of the numerous state of the prisons of the first of October. M. Frances Castagna, a former deputy, and M. Ezekiel Parael, ex-minister of the Finances, had been arrested at Barcelona, and banished to Palma.

M. Jose Maria Lopez had published a pamphlet containing an account of the principal political events which occurred in Spain during the administration of the 9th of May, 1843, and subsequently to the existence of the Provisional Government. That pamphlet discloses important secrets, and satisfactorily explains the conduct of M. Lopez, and his colleagues, and the extraordinary difficulties which they had to encounter.

TURKEY.

CONSTANTINOPLE.—The Augsburg Gazette of the 10th inst. publishes an extract from a letter dated Constantinople, the 22d ult. which announces that the British Ambassador quitted the Capital suddenly, on board of a vessel which was waiting his orders. It is not known in what direction he has proceeded. The precipitate departure of the Ambassador has given rise to many conjectures. Some think that Sir Stratford Canning had proceeded on an expedition of excursion; others attach more importance to the matter, a difference having arisen between the Ambassador and the Ottoman Government, relative to the insult offered to the British consul at Trebizond.

VERY LATE FROM CHINA.

The Merchant Ship Paul Jones, arrived at New York on Sunday last, in 111 days from Canton. The advices from Hong Kong are to the 27th of September.

The most important news by this arrival is the ratification by the Emperor of the Treaty with the United States. It went into effect at Canton on the 25th of September, as far as the Chinese are concerned. As it has also been ratified by the United States Senate, it may be said to be in full force and operation.

The march of civilization has already begun in China. The British Government has opened a Supreme Court, and invited lawyers to practice therein.

The New York Herald has the following summary of news by this arrival, which will prove interesting, as exhibiting the internal affairs of the Chinese Empire.

The intelligence from this city is of a rather alarming nature. Two firms have leased building allotments on the site of the old factories, and have been clearing away the rubbish, preparatory to building. This does not meet the approbation of the merchants, and they have been petitioning the contractors with death if they build for the foreigners, and destruction of the houses. It is not probable that the rumors will keep the word, and the property, or even the lives of the foreigners, are endangered.
