## MY CAMPAIGNS IN CANADA.

AN ORIGINAL TALE—BY D. C. From the Pastimes of a British Officer. "Holy Saint Francis!—that fell my son, and all the reason home, is not this for the village, of the folly, the beautiful youth, and the thoughtless brain, that they took, ungodly passions, that they took, and each one regard, Henry then, that they lived, dear bought pleasure, to be useless work."

CHAPTER I. Ah! this energy-depressing gout, leaves me little amusement except my pen! It is too frequently the companion of half-pay officers. Sitting in my easy chair, with my feet upon a cushioned stool, I can beguile an irksome leisure, by taking down a few chapters of my past life. It is a source in old age, to take a retrospective glance at the scenes of early life, and thus again live amid the spirit-stirring adventures of youth. The sun, after finishing its daily task, will sometimes tinge with gorgeous hues the western sky, and leave behind the most brilliant but evanescent beams of splendor—so I, after achieving the glories of a military career, wish to gild with my pen these humble actions, and disappear with this bright but transient gleam of fame!

Amid the thousand misfortunes which mark the advancing footsteps of Time, there are none more stern than the blighting influence with which he chills and disappoints the joyous anticipations of youth. Forty years ago, when I entered upon the active and arduous duties of a military life, how bright were the paintings of my youthful hopes! There was an attractive beauty in every object on which my ambitious aspirations turned: like the glittering hues of the ocean, when sunbeams glance merrily over its placid surface. I exulted in the splendor of the prospect, without remembering that it soon could be changed into one of storm and darkness. The flower that unfolds its beauties under the genial influence of the morning sun, may wither under its meridian strength—so the delectable world excites hopes in the buoyant breast of youth, which will be crushed in the stern realities of manhood. Success, like the bright beauties of early summer, at first promised me a rich harvest of realized hopes; but the bitter frosts of premature winter, spread, like a chilling fall of snow, over my almost ripened anticipation.

I was born in England, about the year 1738—I do not remember the exact year, for I never paid much attention to the matter. My father was a gentleman of considerable standing, but of moderate fortune, in my native village. Edward Beaumont, the name of my respected parent, and my own, was highly esteemed by the villagers, for his exemplary, though sometimes eccentric deportment. His slender income was quite sufficient for the support of our family, as he enforced the strictest economy, except on the King's birthday, when he evinced his loyalty and enthusiasm, by indulging in some little trifles of extravagance. The pocket money which I received on these occasions, I usually expended in purchasing mimic cannon, and other toys of a warlike nature, which my father was far from being pleased with, as evincing a bent of mind quite contrary to the manner in which he intended to dispose of me. He had, from an early period, formed a very humble opinion of my abilities, and had conceived a design of consigning me to a quiet life in the church. I took every opportunity to testify my repugnance to the ministerial office; but he invariably answered me, by alluding to the absence of any indication of talent, and said that I would never rise in any other profession. I secretly brooded over my fate, and anxiously meditated upon various plans of deliverance. Time wore on, and at the age of twenty my education was finished. My father expressed great surprise that I had made such proficiency in my studies; and I gladly seized this chance of averting my doom. But I was disappointed to find that he still regarded my genius with as poor an opinion as he formerly; and he expressed his settled belief that I was adapted for nothing except the English Church. My destiny now seemed decided, and I was half in despair.

My father was active in his exertions in arranging the preliminaries previous to my taking holy orders, as a successor of the A. A. But an incident at length occurred, which at once prostrated all his intentions, and unexpectedly relieved me from a career of life I so much dreaded. The war in America, with the French Colonies caused a number of changes in the disposition of the regiments stationed in England; and our usually quiet village was opened enlivened with the animating strains of music, as a detachment of soldiers defied through the place, on their way to some port of embarkation. It happened that one of these military divisions was quartered on the inhabitants for the night; and after the usual arrangements had been made with the men, the
