Facts and Straps, original and select.
 THE GOOSEBERRY CASE FINALLY SETTLED.—The Court of Queen's Bench now sitting in Banco at Toronto, gave final judgment in this celebrated case on Saturday last, in favor of the plaintiff, *Murdoull*, thereby sustaining the verdict of the jury. It will be recollected that a verdict for £25 10s. had been rendered against the defendant, Mr. Angus Cameron at the last Fall Assizes for the Midland District. In the Term next after the Assizes, Mr. Cameron, through his Counsel, applied, as he had a perfect right to do, to the Court at Toronto, to have the verdict reversed, and a new trial granted, on the grounds, as he alleged, that the verdict was contrary to law and evidence; and that the learned Chief Justice before whom the case was tried, misdirected the jury as to the law, or in other words, that he laid down at the trial what was not law, and for excessive damages. But the Court were of a different opinion, and held unanimously that the verdict was conformable to law and evidence, and that the Chief Justice had not misdirected the jury on the law, and that the damages were not excessive, and so ends the Gooseberry Case. It is more than probable that Canada contains many Attorneys who would of their own accord have done what Mr. Kenneth Mackenzie has done in this business; but it does not tell the less in his favor, that he has succeeded in obtaining justice for a much injured girl.

THE LATE TREASURER.—Mr. D. J. Smith, has addressed a short letter to the News, in which he complains of the statement in the last *British Whig*. Mr. D. J. Smith makes this great mistake;—it is not the *British Whig* which says, "that he, Mr. D. J. Smith retains in his possessions, the whole of the District Funds, amounting to nearly £2,500," but the Municipal Council of the District, in their public Address to his Excellency, the Governor General, which no newspaper in Kingston but the *British Whig* has yet had the independence to publish.

APPEAL TO PATRIOTISM.—We learn that preparations are now making in this city, for a large indignation meeting, to sustain the administration in the vigorous prosecution of the war, and to frown down the efforts of the mock philanthropists who are endeavoring to lessen the United States in the eyes of the world. Such a meeting of citizens would be an overwhelming rebuke to the politicians in Congress who are now giving "aid and comfort" to Mexico.—*New York Herald.*

IMPORTANT TO TAVERN-KEEPERS.
 On Monday last, one of the Tavern-keepers of Kingston, was fined in the sum of \$5, with costs, for allowing tippling in his house on Sunday, under the Statute of His Majesty, Chap. 45. By the 3d Section of this Act it is provided that any Tavern-keeper allowing tippling in his house on Sunday, shall pay a fine, not exceeding \$10, nor less than \$5, with costs.—*Chronicle.*

THE NEW BISHOPRIC OF MANCHESTER.—It has been definitively settled that early in the next Session Ministers will propose to Parliament the unwise creation of a new Bishopric in a separate diocese, under the title of the "Diocese of Manchester." The new diocese will consist of the arch-deanery of Manchester, including the deaneries of Blackburn, Leyland, Manchester, and Warrington, and also the independent deanery of Andrew's or Arrandness, comprising in the whole 418 parishes, and containing a large number of the most fertile and fertile soil of Lancashire, except the deanery of Carlisle and Furness, comprising 31 parishes, which will still appertain to the diocese of Chester.

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE.—On Wednesday night a young man, in the employment of Mr. Gillingham, the Botanic Gardeners, was found dead in the stove house by which the green houses are warmed. He had laid down to sleep, in company with his gardener, after having put the fire into the stove, and it appears that the gardener had a very narrow escape, being perfectly senseless when the door was opened in the morning. His strong constitution enabled him to endure longer than which would have destroyed a weaker man. The cause of the fatal accident was the influence of the carbonic acid gas escaping from the stove, and which exhaled from the plants during the night. This should be a warning to all persons who sleep in bed rooms, for it is well known to all scientific men that all plants, though they give off oxygen in the day, and at night emit carbonic acid gas, a quantity of carbonic acid gas, as an absolute quantity of ammonia. It is a strange thing that people should be ignorant of a fact like this, and we may attribute such ignorance to the total neglect of all our schools of imparting a little scientific knowledge to the people. In the schools of Prussia and Germany all these kind of things are taught the children, and an accident such as this could not occur unless under the grossest ignorance.

THE JURY returned a verdict of accidental death, by suffocation from the effects of carbonic acid gas.—*Courier.*
