" A case ,- Crumpton vs. Walker,-has just been decided before his Honor Judge Burns, at Toronto, and reported at length in the British Colonist of the 15th ultime. The principal facts are, that the toll of 71/1, was exacted by the Defendant, the Collector, from the Plaintiff, for crossing the road, for the use of which the toll is levied according to the statute. The plaintiff becupied premises, and transacted business, on both sides of the macadamized road, by using a road, that led across the macadamized road on which tall was payabe. Such cases were expressly provided for in the act repealed, when the Act of 9th Vic., now in force, was passed. The repealed act contained a clear exemption from such cases. But the Judge has decided that the toll was illegal, on the construction of the present act, though it does not contain that exemption, and for the two following reasons: 1st, the present act states that the toll is payable for twenty-four hours' use of the road .illegal to exact any toll at them. Toll was to-day. only payable at the gates on the road. There have been other illegal exactions in our own District which ought to be brought to the same test.
