do consume their own -, and other matter with which this water is imprognated. And Sir, I ask, is not the Corporation culpable for a great deal of this misery, when by taking reasonable precautions, instead of wasting their time in framing laws, for the comfort of pigs, they might have if not altogether prevented, at least greatly alleviated it. It is not yet too late to begin the good they have so long neglected, and I would advise them very respectfully so, to begin by ordering that no more inmigrants be landed have never been selected but for the convenience of steamboats, at the expense of the comfort of human beings already too unhappy. If however, the members of the Corporation should consider it beneath their dignity to interfere in this matter, the sooner they resign their eeats the better.

MIDLAND, DISTRICT COLONIZATION AND EMIGRATION SOCIETY.

The Warden of the Midland District, J. B. Marks; Est., having called a Public Meeting of the Inhabitants of this District, for the purpose of organizing the Society, a very respectable meeting took place accordingly, when the Warden was called to the Chair, and Mr.

Cull was appointed Secretary. Mr. Kirkpatrick opened the business of the Meeting by stating that he had a short time since received a letter from the Hon. John A. Macdonald, recommending the formation of such a Society, which he thought would be and that he believed it would receive all the encouragement which His Excellency the Governor General, as well as the Government had it in their power to give. Its primary ohject would be to settle the waste fands in the District, which were well known to be of ex-Province, thereby they were unknown to the thousands of Emigrants that were constantly pasting by them, for the purpose of occupying marts of the Province becoming densely inhabijed; that if such lands were offered by Government as they had been appropriated on the new Owen's Sound road, to absolute settlers, and the common roads leading to them were opened, the country would immediately be filled. Another object of such a Society was to apply the beck townships with servants and aborers, who would be much wanted, as the hey and wheat harvest were rapidly approaching. Mr. Kitkratrick thought that a well organised Pociety, embracing these objects, could not fail to be highly beneficial to the District, and he thought it the best plan to making the following motion:-
