

Bank Office Circular.

Montreal, 1st June, 1847.
Now I have the pleasure to inform you, that with reference to the recent Act of Congress, we are entitled to a Grant in Canada to be sent through the United States Mails, will for the future be subject to the following charges and Regulations:

Newspapers published in Canada and sent from the office of publication to any place in the United States, or from the publishers to an Agent in the United States for distribution, may be sent on pre-payment of the Provincial Rate of one penny each.

News-articles printed in Canada by others than the Publishers, addressed in places in the United States, must be paid an American rate of 3 cents or 2d. each, in addition to the Provincial rate,—making a total charge to be prepaid of 3d. each.

Newspapers sent in Canada addressed to Foreign Countries, to be sent through the United States Mails, Datto.

Newspapers posted in Canada intended to be forwarded to New York by American Steamships to any port on the continent of Europe, Datto, and an additional Sixta of 3 cents each,—making a total pre-paid charge on each paper of 5d.

Unless the above postage is paid at the time of posting, Newspapers cannot be forwarded to the United States or through the United States Mails.

Arrest of a Murderer.—A few days since two of the Irish Police arrived in this city, business of importance, which, until the other day, was a mystery; the particulars are now made public, and we give them as correct as possible. Two much cannot be said in praise of our Police force, and of Mr. Allen, the High Bailiff, for his exertions not only on this but on many other occasions.—When the circumstance was made known to the authorities, they took steps to secure, if possible, the accused, which we are happy to state, resulted in the capture of the proper party. He was arrested by Police Constable Trotter and Dil, at the house of his brother in the neighborhood of Streevels. The following are the particulars of the murder:

Patrick Walsh, son-in-law to Edward Brophy, the party arrested, was murdered by Brophy on or about the 3d May, in consequence of some dispute arising from a partition of property, promised to Patrick Walsh as the marriage portion of Brophy's daughter, to whom he (Walsh) had been married in the month of February last. Brophy, immediately after the murder of Walsh, proceeded to Dublin, accompanied by the wife of Walsh and a younger daughter, from whence he sailed in the ship Georgiana, on the 8th May, after the murder had been committed. The body was taken by another son-in-law in Dublin, named Keating, and carried in a small creek, where it was discovered on the 12th May, by two boys tending cattle, a sudden rain having washed away the gravel by which the body had been covered. Keating was then arrested by the Irish Police, and, in order to extricate himself from the suspicion which attached to him, gave the authorities the information criminating Brophy; and, upon this information, the Government sent out a head constable named Michael Fox, and a sergeant of the same force, named Connor, in search of Brophy, whom they learned had brothers in the Gore of Toronto, to whom it was likely he would come; and, assisted here by the High Bailiff and Police force of the City, they have succeeded in arresting him, after tracing him there.

The unfortunate man has been very unwell since he was taken, and is now in jail, but is confined to the hospital. The circumstances of the murder are quite regular.

THE TWELFTH OF JULY IN TORONTO, ORANGE PROCESSION.

The Anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne was commemorated in this city by a public procession composed of the members of the various Lodges of the Loyal Orange Association. The assembly took place in the Bowring Green, near the terminus of the College Avenue; the arrangements were conducted by R. B. Miller, Esq.; and the number of Brethren in this assembly have been about 350. Each Lodge having preceded its respective banner in the procession, preceded by a band of music, proceeded down the Avenue, Queen Street, and thence through the principal streets of the city, returning to the place of formation. All the members, with but two or three exceptions, were uniformly dressed—white stockings, black coat, and hat. Although the standards of nine different Lodges were displayed, less than one half of the members of the Association in this city were actually in the procession, the majority holding concessions or other scruples as to its propriety. On their return to the Green, the brethren formed in circle, and the standard-bearers advanced to the centre. The effect at this period was decidedly impressive, and was considerably heightened by the comparativelessness of the assemblage, on which they assembled, surrounded as it was by fine trees, in their richest foliage. The thrice were then addressed by R. B. Miller, Esq., and others, who complimented them on their general appearance, and the orderly manner in which they conducted themselves. Three deafening cheers were given for Her Majesty the Queen, and three for the Memory of the late Lord Metcalfe. The various Lodges then moved off, and afterwards dined at their respective Lodge Rooms. All passed over quietly—no breach of the peace occurred—no persons attempted to interfere with them, and they dispersed with no person.—Com. Canadian.

MEETING FOR THE RELIEF OF DISTRESSED ENIGMATES.—Last night a meeting was held in the Old City Hall, it was respectfully, but not numerously attended. Alderman Gunnell was in the Chair, and Mr. M. Hayes acted as Secretary. The chief object was to procure a asylum for convalescent emigrants after they leave the Hospital, until they are able to proceed to their places of settlement, and also for destitute relatives of those who have died. Motions were made by the Chief Justice, Dr. Connor, W. A. Baldwin, Esq., and other gentlemen, introduced with suitable

remarks, and much valuable information was afforded by the Chaplain, and Mr. McElderry, the active and excellent agent for Government. It appears that so indigentatives have been the exertions of the latter gentleman, that of 16,000 or 17,000 immigrants, only 234 remain at Toronto, exclusive of those in the Hospital, and a few in the House, waiting the recovery of their sick friends; and of this small number 60 will leave Toronto to-morrow.

Subscriptions were commenced before the close of the Meeting. The Irish and Highland Relief Committee, with some other gentlemen were appointed to manage the business; Andrew T. McCord, Esq., City Chamberlain, was appointed Treasurer. It is earnestly hoped that a liberal subscription will be obtained.—Toronto Globe.

THE EMIGRANTS.—Every steamer brings a number of poor people, many of them sick and destitute, to our city, and the Hospital is crowded. The main building was found insufficient long since, and a number of temporary wooden buildings have been erected on the grounds, where the inmates are accommodated.

Our expectations are very great, and regard to the imminent risk of their own health. The arrangement and management of the Emigration Agent, Mr. McElderry, is highly praiseworthy, and by continuing to adopt better means, we hope the city may be spared the spread of disease. The weather has fortunately moderated, the heat being less excessive. A meeting was held yesterday evening in the City Hall, for the purpose of taking into consideration the necessary steps to be taken for the relief of the families of deceased emigrants, and those who may be unable to labour. The inhabitants of the town also availed of great numbers, to pay their last tribute of respect to the late worthy officer.—London Times (G. W.)
