Even if I possessed in myself, or had collected  
from others, the material of the most rapid sketch  
of the progress of other sciences, the time would  
fail me in the attempt to convey it to you. I ab-  
stain from any reference to Geology, principally  
from my own ignorance of its later progress. I  
can as little endeavor to bring before the Associa-  
tion the discoveries during the past year by which  
science has ministered to the arts or to commerce;  
yet I cannot leave altogether unnamed—though I  
can hardly do more than name—the discovery  
of the Gun Cotton; and the application of electricity  
to the smelting of copper. For that process, I be-  
lieve, a patent has been recently taken out. As  
yet, perhaps, sufficient time has not elapsed to test  
its full value. We all know that an experiment  
succeeds perfectly in the case of a model, or in a  
laboratory, which may not succeed so perfectly  
when the miniature steam engine, for example, is  
extended to its ordinary size in a manufactory, or  
when the operation is extended from ounces to tons.  
But if the hope, expectations, and confidence of  
the discoverers are realized, the plan will be of  
the greatest value to this country, and of even greater  
proportionate value to some of the Queen's most  
important colonies. It has been said that 10,000  
tons of copper were sent last year from Australia  
to be smelted in England; and that they produce  
more than 1,000 tons of copper. It is evident,  
therefore, that if by this process of smelting by  
electricity, the refuse, namely, 5,000 can be left  
on the spot, 8,000 tons of copper are liberated  
for other purposes of commerce between the colony  
and the mother country; and the saving of costs  
is immense.

throne—the Comte de Paris, who at present seems  
young to rule one way or the other—will not be  
ultimately cut off by a coup de main!

THE FREE NAVIGATION OF THE ST.  
LAWRENCE.

From the *Osgoode Commercial Times*.  
The subject is attracting the attention of  
Commercial men in all quarters. It promises  
to furnish a new arm to the commerce of the  
world, and build up an interest heretofore dormant.  
The West is looking forward to this  
time when ships may clear from any port on  
the Upper Lakes direct for Liverpool. We find  
in the *Chicago Commercial Advertiser*, of the  
27th ult., an article written by P. Rob-  
ertson, Esq., known throughout Northern Illi-  
nois and Wisconsin as an intelligent and ex-

with the shipping interests of all the Lakes.

ANOTHER FRENCH REVOLUTION.  
From *Punch*.
