the west, or a little north-west. While rain is falling, if any small space of th sky is visible, it is almost a certain sign that the rain will speedily couse.

If the clouds that move with the wind become stationary, when they arrive at that part of the horizon which is opposite to the wind, and appear to accumulate, they announce a speedy fall of

There is an ort in writing an advertisement .-It should not be verbose or inflated, or torgid in its composition; and yet "create simplicity" will not always succeed. The nature of the article or subject advertised should be carefully considered -the prominent points connected with it or them should be relected for notice, and put in the foreground, and as much piquancy imparted to the styles as pussible. Although there has been a great advance made in late years in the tone of our advertisements, yet they are susceptible of still further improvement. In France the art of advertisement writing is earried to a much higher stac of perfection than with us. MECHANICAL FORCE OF THE CATAR-ACT OF MIAGARA.

When it is considered that the water power of he cataract of Niegara is uncessing by night as by day, and the power for practical purposes in Great Britain is only applied, on an everage, bout eleven lears per day, during sie days of the week, it may be assumed that the motive ower of the Ningara Falls is at least forty fold f all the water and steam power employed in Great Britain, and probably equal to the aggregate of all the motive power couployed for mechanical

purposes on this earth. The surface of Lake Erie is found to be 231 feet above the surface of Luke Ontario, and 565 feet above that of the ocean. The descent of the waters of Ningara River, in the few miles of distance between Black Rock and Queenston, is about 171 feet, exclusive of the grand cateract itself, forming a succession of rapids, which, is some places, present to view the sublime spectacle of the agitated surface of the ocean in a storm, and these rapids continue to occur during the sabarquest descent of the river St. Lawrence, from the level of Lake Ontario to that of the see, making, in the aggregate, above three-fold of the waterfull of the grand cataract, and consequently one hundred and twenty fold of all the waterfalls and steam engines employed, as above stated, in Great Britain, amitting to take into account the several large rivers that are tributaries of the St. Lawrence.
