heantiful and costly work is, we need scarcely explain to our readers, to evade the Lachine Rapids, and to unite, by canal and lockage, the Lake above, and the Harbor below. The total rise is about 46 feet, and the works are carried along a continuous natural allevial bottom, over which, in former times, no doubt, the main flood of the St. Lawrence flowed .-It presents every variety of character, never very much varying in level, but sometimes consisting of deep clay and marl, sometimes day. of elevations of the limestone and fields of shale, which, in two instances, in the course of the nine miles, are broken up by vertical whimstone dykes from one to two feet thick. But, in general, the strata, as is usual in this country, lie with a horizontality unusual to the eye accustomed to the physical features of the West of Europe. The excavation and embankment are, as usual in such works, protty equally divided; the general principle, to cut out as much from the hills as shall embank the hollows, being particularly easy of application. In no case is it necessary to have ascending, as well as descending locks.
