About 150 years ago, the familiar drink 'yelege " London Porter," (not the wishy-washy stuff called " London Buttled Porter,") first became generally known, and was then chiefly patronised by porters and laboring man, hence its name. When called for, it was drawn as " Half-and-half" still continues to be drawn, from separate butts or taps; with this difference, that whereas "Half-and-half" is composed of equal parts of ale and porter, so " Porter," when it was drunk, was drawn from equal parts of " Ale," "Two-Penny" and "Small Beer." In a very short time Porter became so universally liked, that the great London Brewers comcombine the excellencies of its three compounds, "Ale," "Two-Penny" and "Small Beer :" and such Publicans who sold the new drink, mentioned the same conspicuously over their doors, by sticking up "Whitbread's Entire Butt." or, " Minx & Reid's Entire Butt." or " Barcley, Perkins & Co.'s Entire Butt," &c. &c., to designate that the "Porter" was drawn from one butt, and not from three. In course of time the word "Butt" came to be omitted, although it is occasionally yet seen shout town. While speaking of London Porter, we desire
