

The Montreal Herald says:—We mention in our last issue, that some private views from Upper Canada, which had the support of the present government were attempting to make political capital for themselves, by agitating the removal of the Seal of Government from Montreal to Toronto; and that they were using this, as an argument against Mr. Baldwin, in the Fourth Riding of York. We hear that this fact is not only denied, but that our authority for stating it, is also called in question. We are not at liberty to mention the names of the writers, but we pledge ourselves for the authenticity of the above extract. We further receive information, that the last few days, Slaves still exist in the minds of many of our readers, if they will favor us with a call at this office, we think we can fully satisfy them.

Toronto, 3rd Dec., 1847.

" There appears now to be no doubt of the dissolution of Parliament being near, and, in anticipation thereof, discussions upon an approaching election are becoming the absorbing topic. I have heard that the Ministry hint a change of the seat of Government from Montreal to Upper Canada—a hint not doubtful to strengthen their position with their own, and to have considerable effect upon the Radical party."

" The dissolution of Parliament is now anticipated as a matter of certainty, and political parties are on the alert for action. We are anxious of a large accession to our present majority, and of course a corresponding diminution of the Radical party."

It has been informed that a change of the present Seat of Government, will, in all probability, be mooted in the next Parliament, if the present administration continue in office—a measure which, of itself, ought to entitle them to our support."

From the Montreal Correspondence of the Coburg Star.

Sir.—When, in advance of all your contemporaries, you received from me the information relative to the intended dissolution of Parliament, you did not attach to it the degree of credit, which subsequent events prove that you might with safety have done. I have now another piece of news to communicate which, as it involves what you would be inclined to think an impossibility, will meet with but little respect at your hands. It is this:—The University will not pass in its present form. The new arrangement is as follows. The University will be dissolved and the University to remain as it stands, with an addition, however, of a Moral Philosophy Chair, and the Crown Lands are to be appropriated to endow Victoria, Regiopolis, and Queen's Colleges. This is astounding, but, nevertheless, true.

If Messrs. Robinson & Cayley have not stuck in the mud in Upper Canada, you will see them in Coburg about Monday or Tuesday. They leave in high spirits; indeed they are sure of a large increase to their forces by the next meeting of the House, which will take place in February.

I see that the Conservative papers of Canada West are without exception prophesying an increased majority, "after their kind." In this section the Ministry expect to gain.

You must not imagine from the quietude of our political horizon, that we take no interest in the coming struggle. The L. P. S. have, I am told, been organized to protect the Conservative votes in the city and Terrebonne. A few broken heads are, of course, anticipated.

It is more than probable that you will see Mr. Gowan's name in the next Gazette. Not, however, as a bankrupt, but as a Superintendent of the Banks of the Canal. It will not have the effect of locking up his tongue. He is now fairly embarked on the " tide of fortune," which, however, like a canal tide, is apt to ebb.


