ed with any new acquisition, would be found very
conductive to the real interests of Science. Every
functionary should be faithfully registered, and if
there should be a relay, or anything else not
against him, a note should be made of the fact
of the record should be open to the public on
payments of small fee for searching.
This would be much better than the loose system
of keeping our astronomical accounts which
now in force, and which seems to depend on
some star-gazers, who send gratuitously the
fruit of their observations to the newspapers.
We are surprised that the comets and stars
spoken of by these gentlemen are never to be found
in the books of the stars. Our star registry system
might contain an index that should be refer-
red to, and by turning at once to the par-
ticular star, we should be able to ascertain whether
it was a proper name, or whether its name was not a
mere optical illusion of an alleged discovery.
