FASHIONS FOR JANUARY.
The warm and comfortable doublets has reappeared this winter in an approved form ornamented by quilting. In patterns for evening social parties they are made in pink and mink satin, trimmed with ermine, and small mantlets to match. The style of trimming redingotes is no longer confined to the tablier form; many have trimmings encircling the skirt, particularly in quilting. Cloth dresses are worn, dark blue and claret being the favorite colors; they are embroidered in snatches, intermixed with embroidery in relief, the light back of the corsage being equally ornamented with the front; they are also accompanied by mantlets embroidered and festooned; some have merely a single wide galon velvet, or four very narrow ones divided by buttons. The gim trimming continues an indispensable accessory of most gowns, and not only for robes and mantaux, but also bonnets and caps are frequently ornamented by them; fringes, ooles and crepe are much used on ball dresses. Walking and carriage dresses are made tight and high, with long sleeves, closing at the wrists; for evening wear the closings are low, tight and pretty; many having draperie on the top; pretty little mantlets are made for evening use, of lace, or plain tulle trimmed with several rows of lace; the rich lace scarf is, however, more elegant. Flowers are very much used on ball dresses, either in bunches or wreaths forming mantlets, or coronas so small as to form the headings of flounces; those of foliage are particularly pretty. The velvet bonnets are mostly of dark colors, black, royal blue, vanilla, but they are lined with much tulle inside, and ornamented with much tulle inside; plumes of small feathers are fashionable, the last falling low, but the most elegant ones have a single ostrich feather nose, with marabouts, or a bird of Paradise; gimps is also used on velvet bonnets, in a kind of rosette covering the crown.—Velours epingle is very fashionable this season, in all shades of grey, fawnite and deep blue. The pardessus were never prettier than they are this winter: the forms are various, whether in velvet, satin de chine, casimir, or drap cachemire; it is for young ladies, of satin a la reine, with sleeves and, made close to the waist. Mantaux de veite reach very low, and have several rows of trimming. Very pretty little caps are made of narrow blonds, and narrow velvet, with lappets of blond; velours epingle, and stamped velvet, form numerous coiffures, mixed with black lace, and the half squares of lace are much in favor, confined by a bouquet of flowers or a small noisette.—London and Paris Modes Magazine of Fashion.

"THE NATIONAL DEFENCES"
THE DEER OF WELLINGTON'S LETTERS.—We read it with a melancholy feeling, for it seems to prove that the mind of the "great captain" is gone. The general idea which it puts forth is preposterous, for it is impossible to conceive a nation, on the part of France or any other power, for such an invasion as the aged Duke contemplates with terror, to say nothing of the certainty that an invading army must inevitably be destroyed before it could reach London. Then the language of the letter is equally conclusive in proof of the Duke's pendency; it is an incoherent and often unmeaning. On some paragraphs it is impossible even to guess at the purport.

As a very fit pendant to the letter we have a ludicrous despatch from Pech, assuming to be the French commander's report of his march to London and of his doings there.

LONDON TAKEN BY THE FRENCH.
HEAD QUARTERS, BUCKINGHAM PALACE, London. [Date not read.]

MONSIEUR—I have the honor to communicate the intelligence of the landing of the army under my command on the coast of Dover, with the submission of the capital of England. I write this in the Palace of the Guulphs, where the tri-color waves triumphantly above the standard of our national ensign.

Our troops embarking at Boulogne, at Calais and Dunkirk, met midway in the Channel.—The wind falling, the transports were towed by the Comte de Paris, the Chateau d'Eu, La Charite and other steamers. At daybreak we came to anchor, and at 7 P. M. landed the troops—with horses and artillery—from the jolly boats. The guns from Dover Castle kept an unsteady dropping fire during the disembarkation; at length a handful of the Algerine Immortals, irritated by the proximity of the enemy, scaled the chalk cliff, and in five minutes—by the watch—skipped the Castle of Dover.

On the capture of the Castle, the Mayor and Corporation of Dover brought the key of the town to the beach, and supplicated for honorable terms of capitulation. There I have thought fit to grant; thus leaving the friendliest disposition in my heart.

At 9 o'clock the directors of the railway appeared with first class tickets for the whole of the army; having, moreover, under the direction of our commissariat, provided the necessary means of transit for baggage and articles.

Our army arrived at 11 o'clock in London, very fresh and in the highest spirits. We formed at the station, and marched over London bridge.—Here we saw the Pool of the Thames—all the shipping had already hoisted the tri-color—while, remembering the glory of our national marine, I have honourably ordered to be called the Belle Poulx.

At the end of the Rue du Roi de Guillaume—in English, King William street—the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of London presented themselves. His Lordship begged that the hospital might be spared on the payment of fifty millions sterling. To this—the money being ready—I thought fit to accede. (A bell is to be given to the conqueror and daughters of the merchants and bankers.) His Lordship then unveiled a panorama of London, and distributed billets to the army according to the choice of the officers.

As we approached Lombard street, we learned that the Guards, accompanied by the Earl of Esher, had left London by the Windsor road.

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
