The enot determined aspect of Mr. Ellett, was observed by all. Truly we live in a wondrous age-to see a gentleman in a carriage floating through the air, 250 feet above the waters, on wires which are used in electricity; when we reflect upon it, our immagination is raised, so that the mind, regulated by the experience of past days, is lost in as-tonishment. It was indeed a proud spectacle for all, but especially for those who promoted and have taken an interest in the construction of the bridge, - all surmises are put to flight, as to the practicability of it, by this day's exhibition. SEELEY, THE SWINDLER. Under the head of " Border Burbarities" the New York Tribune publishes several paragraphs taken from different papers respecting this individual Amongst them is the following account of the arrest of Secley, taken from the Courier & Enquirer, to whom it is said to have been communicated by " a gen-tleman of the highest character." It will be seen that it differs in some particulars from the secount given in the Pdot, which was derived from Mr. Nelson, one of the pasty who went

in pursuit of Seeley:-" Potsdam, St. L. Co., N. Y., Feb. 26. " Last Wednesday afternoon a well dressed and gentlemanly appearing man was seen coming up the streets of Hopkinstown village, backing before a large mob who were armed with bludgeons and other murderous weapons.

"On reaching the village tavern his pur-suers and himself halted, and it was ascertaiened that the man's name was Seeley, late a merchant of Canada, and that the mob were hent on agresting him, as they alleged, for some dreadful crime committed in Canada. In the presence, and in the hearing of all, Seeley declared his innocence of any crime, but said he owed debts in Canada, which he could not he claimed the protection of the law; and again and again declared his willingness to autrender himself to the authorities of this State, but as often said that he would never be taken alive by such a riotous body of men and smuggled into Canada, where he would

be imprisoned without hope of escape. " During all this time, wither the Montreal nerchant, Nelson, who had raised the hoe and ery, nor any of his assistants, had the smallest scrap of writ, precept or legal warrant; but now a warrant was shown to Serley, which had been hastily obtained from a neighboring magistrate, and on his declaring his suspicion that it was not valid, but only a hoax that he might be kidnapped and carried over the line, he was shot down in the streets like a mad dog by a constable of the

"It was found that his right knee was dreadfully shattered, and he rendered a cripple for life, if indeed he escapes with life even. You may well imagine the borror of he community when it was learned from Nelson that his only excuse for the pursuit on his part, the savage attack of the armed mob. and the final shooting down of a man who was anxious to deliver himself up to the hands of the law, was, that Seeley owed him a debt of sixty pounds, which was not due until next

"The warrant upon which the final arrest was pretended to be made, was illegally is-sued, and void in its face. It is said, moreover, that the gun with which the man was shot, was procured at the office of the magistrate to whom Seeley applied for legal protection. The feelings of exasperation are intense, and it is highly probable that thuse engaged in the outrage will suffer punish-

ENGLAND AND CUBA.

There can be little doubt that the recent perch of Lord George Bentinck, in the Briish Parliament, in relation to England seizing the island of Cuba, was intended as a sort of feeler, to ascertain whether such an act would be tolerated or justified by the United States, and we are surprised that the subject has not been referred to by Congress in some way or other. Its neglect to do so may perhaps have been caused by the debates and agitation on the Treaty with Mexico; but now that that matter is disposed of, we hope that this very important subject will not be passed over in silence. The United states and Cuba are geographically so situated that the former could not tolerate the ownership of the latter being transferred to any of the great Enropean powers. With the ownership of that island vested in England, that haughty and imperious power would possess a control over this country of a most tremendous nature. With the improvements and discoveries in ocean steam navigation, and with her imnense navy, she could exercise complete control over the whole of the commerce of the United States, and compel us to be continually in dread of her naval power, or to reconstruct our navy on a scale that would enable it to cope with hers. Self-preservation, the first law of nature, seems to demand that we should not tolerate the transfer of that island to any European power, and to insist, that if Spain has any intention of parting with it, that she shall transfer it to the United States.
