Judge Robinson; Crown Officer, the Hon.

J. E. Small. The Uständar, owing to the

proficiency, as it would appear, that of sharing

in their plying prostitution.

They cannot, at this time, afford to at-

ttempt to reprobate the practices of certain individuals

who are officially encouraged, and invite to crime, by the facility with which they par-

take, from utter strangers and children, without the slightest investigation, articles of property at such reduced prices as must have at once convinced them that they had not been

honestly acquired.

Now that a Union of Industry has been

established in the City, there can be no ex-

use for the many beggars which infest the

streets, the Juries therefore trust that the

Court will be pleased to call the attention of

the city authorities to the suppression of this

evil.

In several cases of minor delinquencies

which have been brought before them, they

car not but hope the laws of the country would

permit of such matters being more summarily

disposed of, than by the protracted and ex-

pensive mode of indictment at the Quarter

Sessions.
