

an Act of War against the French, was issued Monday, containing a Royal Proclamation for the regulation of the Quarantine Establishment at Goose Isle during the ensuing year. The orders are most stringent, no vessel having more than thirteen persons on board is to anchor at the Quarantine; if there has been any disease on board, it is to be anchored at the Quarantine; if there has been any disease on board from any port where infection has been prevalent, it is to undergo a thorough examination, and the direction given is to be landed on the Island, and thence and their clothing and baggage, to undergo a compulsory scrubbing. The Island is placed under the authority of a military commandant.
