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HOUSE OF LORDS—March 14.
THE PARLIAMENTARY BILL.
Was, on the motion of Earl Grey, a second
time read, and the debate thereon was
continued from the previous evening.
The Lord Chancellor moved for the
second reading of the bill, and in support
thereof he said, that the bill was of great
importance, and that it would be of great
