That dogs are subject (this very rarely.) to a distressing malady, communicable to Man, we admit; but that it is prevented by keeping the poor animals confined, we uttelly deny. On the contrary, tying up the poor animals in cellars and dark places, and keeping them scantily supplied with food and water, is one of the surest ways to produce that disease which has hither defied the efforts of man to core or ameliorate. And the chance of hydrophobia being communicated to man becomes infinitely greater when dogs are confined, than when suffered to to roam at large. And this important fact should never be lost sight of, that hydrophobia is communicated to man, as often by the bite of an angry animal, as by the bite of a rabid one; and dogs, when confined, are very much disposed to snap at and bite those who ap-

proach them, even for the purpose of feeding We might go further in this argument, and deny the existence of any mad dogs in this vicinity, and the consequent inutility of any proclamation to confine them; but, as we have not seen the depositions made before the Mayor of Kingston, we shall ebstain.
