Very Important.—About 100,000 bushels of Canadian Wheat will be received at Rochester, this spring—23,000 bushels have already been received. As large a quantity, we believe, may be done. On Oswego, we understand, pay a duty of about 15 cts. per bushel, is flour, and sold in the Eastern Markets. The price of wheat in Canada averaged 80 cents per bushel. Those who understand the trade say this will yield a fair profit at the price.

The Liverpool Advertiser states that two Irish vessels, on the point of leaving that port at this time, hoisted the Irish national flag. Upon this being perceived, they were immediately pursued by a Government vessel, whenceupon they promptly lowered the obnoxious emblem. "Punch" says the emblem for the Irish standard ought to be a Hyena, the creature according to Wombley's natural history, "its kindness cannot conciliate, nor banger taste."

Samuel Sutherland, of Toronto, Gentleman, to be a Landing Master and Searcher in Her Majesty's Customs in the Province of Canada.

John Sutherland, of Guelph, Gentleman, to be a Notary Public in that part of the Province formerly called Upper Canada.

NEW YORK MARKET—May 2.

PROVISIONS.—Mess Poole is firm, and the sales are 1500 bushels at \$10.12½ a \$10.25, and \$25 & 50cts for Prime. A sale of 500 bushels was made, deliverable by Canal, in ten days, at \$7.50.

BEEF is dull, but firmer than it was. A sale of 100 lbs. Beef Ham, was made at \$12.50.

LARD is rather firm, but without change. Sales 200 lbs.

ASPIRE are \$6 for Pots, and \$7.75c a \$7.87c for Pease.

GROCERIES are heavy. Sales at auction 16,000 packages, and 2,500 tons or loose. Weetby Sugar at \$7.81c a \$5.75c per cwt.

Sales Tallow at \$1.50c a \$1.9c.

Flour and MEAL.—The demand was rather better to-day for flour, but the market is without change to notice. The tendency of prices is downwards, and in some cases sales are reported at 6c decline on the prices of yesterday. The transactions are about 3000 or 3,500 barrels, including Common Wheat New York, at \$5 a \$5.62; good brandy \$5.12½ a \$5.16; pure \$5.25 a \$5.31; Michigan \$5.18½ a \$5.25; Brooklyn \$5.12½ a \$5.25; there is a fair demand for the last and also from the trade. Sales of Rye Flour at \$5.25c. Meal is rather scarce and held firmly at \$3.37½ for Jersey.

GRANAT.—There continues to be a good demand for Wheat, and 1500 bushels Genesee, \$1.40c, and 1000 bushels White Ohio at \$1.25 for milling. A sale of Chicago was made at \$1.35, but we could not trace it.

CORN is but little doing, and the market is steady at 48c or 49c.

WHEAT is scarcely so firm. Sales 200 bushels.

CHALK closed heavy at 10½ a 10½ for best.
