

I shall leave this city to-morrow morning, on my return home. New York is not the place to see or experience poverty. There may be much of it, but none of it is visible. The city is full of people doing business, and there seems no want of business to be done. No one here complains of had been, or want of money, but all appear busily engaged in the pursuit of riches. The streets are crowded with elegant equipages, and the above are filled with buyers; all is plenty and bustle, and every thing is *order* and *drive*. How different are the quiet towns of Canada, and how different are the habits, thoughts, feelings and actions of the people. And yet, few few of us would really wish to change residence, or occupations; satisfied that in moderate enjoyments there is more real contentedness, and that in the most of all the glitter and show with which I am surrounded, there is an empty and dreary void. During the four days I have passed in New York, I have had excitement enough to last me for the next four years to come. The business I have done here has been small, and unsatisfactory; but that must ever be the case, when visits are made so few and far between, as those of mine in New York.

S.—WELLAND HOUSE, Oswego, Oct. 1.—On my return home, I met with some copies of the *British Whig*, by which I perceive, that during my temporary absence from the desk, you have been indulging in some wounding recriminations with the *Kingston Herald*.
