**Extracts from late English Papers.** **BRUTAL MURDER.** Three men have been most brutally murdered at Buxton, in Tipperary. They were three bailiffs, who had been placed as "keepers" on the grounds of a man named Brien, against whom a distress warrant of poor rates had been issued. The details are given in the following account of the inquest.—Mr. Dalton, of Tipperary, the first witness called, was a poor rate collector. He had occasion to go frequently to Redmond Brien's, of Roseshid, for the rates and arrears due by him. About a month ago he summoned Brien to the court house of Buxton, in consequence of his having removed his stock off the land, and a Bench warrant was granted against him for £4 4s 4d. He received an intimation that Brien had removed his stock to another man's land, whose name he believed also to be Brien. On Friday morning last he gave the Bench warrant to place keepers on the corn of Brien, which had been removed. Ryan placed the three deceased men, named Regan, Walsh, and Dwyer, as keepers on the corn. P. Cahill, of Croughbrook, stated that he resides within about half a mile of where the deceased men were placed as keepers. Slept at home on Saturday night, and on Sunday morning about seven o'clock he was in bed. Deceased Regan entered the house, and told him that there were men coming after him, and that in about ten minutes several men came to the door, but were refused admission. One of the party broke the kitchen window, and another said, "If you don't let us in we will burn the house." One of the bailiffs inside shouted out, "If you will spare our lives we will take you over to come again." The people asked if they had pistols inside, and were told they had not, upon which a large stone was thrown against the door. The lock was broken, and the door opened. Three men entered, one of whom had a gun. Walsh and Dwyer were begging for their lives, and said they would never come again. Regan was pulled out by the party, and the three men again entered the house. Dwyer and Walsh fell on their knees, and implored for mercy, but they were both murdered in the kitchen. One was shot, and the other was beat and killed from blows with the barrel. Deponent states that after Dwyer and Walsh were killed, the three men who killed them left the house. Went with them and saw Regan surrounded by six or seven persons at a house on a passage leading into the yard. One of the party desired Regan to go on his knees. He did so, and was immediately attacked. Head repeated blows given to him, and saw a gun pointed to him, upon which he (deponent) retired, leaving that he might be hurt, as the gun was pointed towards where he was standing. After the murder of the three, the six or seven men went away at a slow pace and faced towards the mountains. Does not know any of the party who entered his house, and those who did not tell their faces black and were disfigured. The jury returned a verdict of "Guilty" against some person or persons unknown. Another man, named Cahill, residing at Buxton, has since been taken into custody on a charge of being concerned in the murder of the three men.

**SINGULAR CASE OF CONCEALMENT OF SEX.** The particulars of a very singular case of concealment of sex at Marblefield, have come to light during the past week. The facts, as far as we have been able to gather them, are the following: On Saturday, Mr. Bland, one of the medical men of the Marblefield Union, received a certificate from the relieving officer, requiring his attendance upon a man in the workhouse as described as John Smith, aged 43, by trade a cooper and tinker, belonging to a village, and residing in Derbyshire, as a laborer at the house of one Mrs. M. Cann. Mr. Bland attended the individual in the course of the day, and found the complaint under which he was laboring to be that of dysentery. On looking at the man and hearing his voice, he was struck with his peculiarity; the face, lips, general expression, and the voice being those of a woman. Mr. Bland asked the landlady of the house whether it was a man or a woman. Mrs. Cann replied by saying, "I don't know, doctor. All I can tell you is, that he and his wife have lodged here nine weeks, and he has always dressed as a man, and followed his occupation as a cooper and tinker, and sometimes got up as much as 10s a day. The statements thus made by the woman satisfied him for the time that he was in error in supposing the individual calling himself her husband, to be a woman; but subsequent visits served to re-awaken his suspicions. In the mean time the symptoms of the disease became more aggravated, and the individual died. On hearing of the death, Mr. Bland immediately proceeded to the house, and ascertained that the person was beyond all doubt a female. He again questioned the woman calling herself the wife of the deceased till the day before the death, when she declared that she would allow no one to assist her to lay out the body, but saw it up in a sheet, which she did; and it was in that state when Mr. Bland visited the house almost immediately after the death. On being further questioned, the woman stated that the slowness of the man, who she had spoken, were by another husband, who was dead; and the reason she gave for living with the deceased was that she was promised her maintenance, which promise seems to have been faithfully kept by the deceased. Mr. Bland communicated the facts of the case to the police, in order that an inquest might be held, but as no proceeding was not deemed necessary. The body was interred on Sunday last, at Christ Church, as John Smith, and the numbers attending to witness the funeral, the case seemed to have excited considerable interest. The surviving woman has since, we understand, devalued to the Registrar of the district the real name of the deceased, which was Sophia Locke. The account given of her life is as follows:— She was the daughter of a man named Locke, who was a prisoner, grinder and tinker. He had several children besides the deceased, who appears to have been the only daughter. He led the life of a gipsy, travelling from place to place with his family, and carrying with him his tent. The deceased was born in a cave near Crocker Wood, in Sutton, and a highly respectable lady of that neighbourhood is said to have been present at the birth. At three years of age she assumed male attire, and used to accompany a brother to various towns, visiting the public houses, and dancing to a violin which he played. In this manner she grew up to womanhood, and then commenced the trade of her father. The family, it appears, used to winter always on Biddlegate Moor, and it was only known as a house among the natives of that place that she was a woman. The fact, however, subsequently became well known among them from the following circumstances taking place:—A quarrel took place between her and a man, and a p. ebed battle between them was the result, in which the female overcame the victor. In the contest her breast accidentally became exposed, and then it was that her name became known as a fact. About 14 years ago she became acquainted with a woman with whom she was living when she died, and they lived together until her death, which took place in 1847. They had married all over England. Last year they lived in Worcestershire picking hops. They lived very happily together, until the deceased, who could earn half-a-crown a day sometimes, and the man very well. The deceased was of slender make, and some years ago a profusion of black glossy hair, which was carefully curled and dressed, as in an usual manner, to take off the suspicion of disguise; this, with a total absence of beard, and a very sweetly complexion, produced a great amount of the gipsy pretence.—*London Dispatch.*

**TRANSMISSION OF SIGNALS UNDER WATER BY THE ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.** On Wednesday last, some experiments were tried under the direction of Mr. Cox, superintendent of the Electric Telegraph Company in Manchester, in order to ascertain the practicability of transmitting signals by Electric Telegraph under water. The wire which was used on this occasion was of copper, which, after having been wrapped with cotton and passed through sheath, had been then covered with a thin coating of gutta serena. Wire of a similar description has been used with success in the Summit tunnel on the Liverpool and Yorkshire Railway, through which the signals were with great facility transmitted by this method. A great deal of its value in this respect was ascertained by the experiments of the late Mr. Cooke. One end of the wire was connected with the electric battery, and the other end was connected with the Morse's Battery, which was situated in the room in which the signals were to be transmitted. The wire was then allowed to hang from the ceiling of the room to a large tub of about half a mile in length, with water, while the other end of it was a vertical still water, into the office of Mr. William Gaskell, who, some hundred yards higher up, on the left side of the river, where it was connected with an instrument. The connection between the wire and the instrument in Mr. Gaskell's office, the wire was transmitted from the one place to the other with the utmost ease. The distance of the wire was only five degrees (a definition which was easily ascertained upon the supposition that the coating of the signal wire had been cut through to some place by the wire which was then over it to obtain the weights necessary to retain the signal-wire in its place, in consequence of the unusually strong current which was running, caused by the heavy rain of the night previous) the ordinary deflection being two or three degrees, while in rainy weather (such as the day on which the experiment was made) it would probably amount to as much as fifteen degrees between Liverpool and Manchester. The cost of the wire used in the water during the night, and on Thursday the experiments were repeated with the same success, so that there seems to be no reason to doubt that the wire, coated as we have described, will be an efficient means of conveying signals under water. Should this prove to be the case, it is probable that one of the first applications of the invention will be to establish a communication by electric telegraph between Liverpool and Birkenhead. *Manchester Guardian.*

**FALL OF SAINT EDWARD'S OAK.** The great oak in Horse Wood, which has by long tradition been marked out as the reliable tree at which the "Virgin King and Mary" was shot with arrows, lately fell to the ground. The trunk of this tree was only 12 feet in height up to its separation into branches, measured five feet in diameter, and contained 63 loads of timber, and the arms yielded about nine loads more, by a
