BOSTON, June 26.
St. John's papers received yesterday state that the fire in the woods was still raging. A letter from St. Andrew, June 19th, says that a whole village a New River, including Fy's & Fabian's Saw Mill were burned with large quantities of lumber, more than 100 persons were obliged to fly to the beach for their lives. The fire was burning out on both sides and other saw mills were destroyed.
