EXCHANGES.

These amounts from London are to the last inst and from Liverpool a day later, but they contain nothing of a clearing nature, and every cargo of trade seems to be languishing and much depression is experienced by the whole commercial concern.

Those interested in the Wood Trade complain more of late than they have done for the last three years, and as these have been, and we regret to say that the whole will encourage for holding, added to the great enrollment of a numberless enterprise, we are very little hopes of success in the English Market for some time to come.

With these advices before us, with a considerably small fleet, we cannot be surprised if our trades in the preceding character of our market, and we never remember the month of May and June as unusually quiet, as those have been.

White Pine and Red Pine are dull at our quotations, and are failing to make their appearance, but are not off sale. The others, however, are all going fairly well, and no reason of the other at all, but to be sold for shipping, and with the quantity annually imported, it is a safe deduction, that there is more than the export at this particular time.

Oak and Elm commands most attention, and the transactions on both, as well as in States, are tolerably active.

Bigs Pine Dealer are asking for, especially at the present time, more and second-hand timber, but there is a great deal of inquiry now, so London, as far as I am aware, there is an entire cessation of demand.

W. & P. give us a sum indication of the quantity of Pine in Town we are bound up to the 19th last and a sum to us by the Supervisor of Customs, a comparative statement of the same attached, and up to the 24th June, 1849.
