City Council. Monday, July 19, 1849. President—His Worship, the Acting Mayor: Aldermen McLellan, Smyth, McConce, Flanagan, Councillors Wiley, Linton, Waddingham, Matthews, Bartlett, Gardiner.

The minutes of the last Meeting were read. Hon. J. A. Macdonald was read for the use of City Hall during the Convention of the British American League—Granted.

D. T. Witherspoon, Secretary Gas Light Company, was read, stating that the Company will be prepared this autumn to furnish the Corporation with as many Gas Lights for the Streets, &c., as they may deem necessary.

R. Tassell, to lay down building materials—granted on the usual conditions. M. MacNamara to rent two shops in City Building—referred to the Market Committee.

James Powell, payment of account—referred to Finance Committee. Jeremiah Bastow and others, to open a drain—referred to the Committee on Streets, &c.

Walter Kyles, to get a transfer of Victroling House License—referred to the Police Committee. John Ferzer, to be allowed to drive a Cab under his Livey Stable License—referred to the Committee on Cabmen.

George Reilly, to get a transfer of Carter's License—there was no action taken thereon, being contrary to law. E. Boyle, to open a Drain from premises—referred to the Committee on Streets, &c.

D. Chaville, respecting rent of Stall in Market—referred to the Market Committee, to report thereon. On motion of Alderman Flanagan, Resolved—That the City Council together with the Rev. Mr. Greer, Rev. Mr. Machar, Rev. Mr. Reid, Rev. Mr. Burns, the Right Rev. Bishop Pielan, Rev. Mr. Douie, Rev. Mr. Lorimer, Rev. Mr. Fenwick, Rev. Mr. Harper, and Dr. Mair, be the Local Board of Health for this City.

That the Board of Health meet at the Mayor's Office at 10 o'clock every morning for the transaction of business. On motion of Mr. Waddingham, That a list of the number of Meetings of the City Council for 1849 up to July 16th, be published together with the attendance of each member.

That the owner of the timber at the West end of Wellington Street, be notified by the City Surveyor, to remove the same within twenty days. The following Members of the City Council were elected a Court of Appeal on Assessments viz. Aldermen Flanagan, Ford, McLellan, and Councillor Waddingham. The Council adjourned.

THE IMMIGRATION. The Immigration of the present year has not as yet been excessive, burdensome, or troublesome. A large portion of the Immigrants have been comparatively well off, and able to bear their own burdens, which owing to the steamboat opposition, have not been excessive in the way of locumotion.

CANADIAN AFFAIRS.—ANNEXATION AND CONFEDERACY.

Affairs in Canada are certainly becoming serious and threatening. The rupture between the ultra-loyalists, or British party, and the mother country is complete.

There is a great mistake committed by the people of the United States, when they say that the present condition of Canada and the present feelings of the British party have been produced by the moral influence of American institutions, and by the contrast which the American republic presents to Canada.

A LYNN SHOOT.—We are informed that an animal of the Lynx species, known among the Canadians by the name of *Loup-cervier*, was shot early on the morning of the 7th inst.

THE ST. LAWRENCE AND CHAMPLAIN CANALS.—We learn that a meeting of some influential gentlemen is to be held at the City of Montreal on the 20th of the month, with a view to taking measures for the construction of this great international work.

There always has been a party in Canada in favour of incorporating it with the United States. It was composed principally of commercial men; but some of the British, or loyalist party were connected with it.

YOUTHFUL PRESENCE OF MIND.—Some short time since, an unusual young ladies were fishing on the banks of the Thames, near London, Canada West—two little boys, one the son of the Rev. Mr. Barrett, and the other the son of Dr. Straford, about 11 years of age.

CAPE OF TRADE IN CANADA.—With a far higher tariff than at present, the whole of the Customs revenue collected at Toronto, Kingston, Brockville, and the other 32 ports of entry in Upper Canada, during the year ending on October 31st, was \$51,210 (for collection of which \$9,000 were paid) while under the new direction of the trade, and which amounts to the Montreal merchants, \$55,000 of revenue have been collected during the last quarter of the year of Toronto alone, on imports almost entirely from this side.
