mob, and they broke the blinds and panes of glass some of them striking the wall on the other side of the room. This continued for a few seconds and then shots were returned from the house. I cannot tell how many shots were fired from the house. I saw the Bash of two or three fire arms from the mob. I am shortsighted, it was dark and I could not distinguish the numbers of the mob, except from the yells and cries, but I should say they must have been a numerous body. I consider the lives of the family and my own life were in danger from the mob. After the discharge from the

house, the mob left immediately.

By Mr. Johin-1 am morally certain that no one could have made himself heard in order o prevent the mob from approaching the house. By other Jurors-When the mob left, I did not know that any person was hurt. I remained there, the greatest part of the night, and there was no farther disturbance. I took an active part in in defending Mr. Lafontaine's house, on far as my presence could go. Bollets and buck shot were used to load the firearms used that night in the house. The firearms were common pistal- and fowling-pieces -private property. Some time after the ofter, I heard a person was shot, and I think I might have beard the name.
