SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD'S STATEMENT.

-More than ordinary interest was attached to the proceedings of the Royal Commission on Wednesday, inasmuch as Sir John A. Macdonald, against whom particularly the fiercest fulminations of the Grit press have been directed, appeared to give evidence in connection with the charges prepared against the Government-that they betrayed Canadian interests by selling the charter Allan and certain American capitalists for a sum of money which was to be spent in aiding the return of Ministerial candidates at the late general election.

The evidence already given before the Commissioners, especially that of the members of the Cabinet who have been examined exclusive of the statement of Sir John A. Macdenald, proved in the most unquestionable manner that instead of the Government having negotiated with the American the road, positively opposed to doing anything that would permit of the Americans getting such a hold as might lead to them, at a future time, being in a position to control it. We cannot possibly arrive at any other conclusion from the evidence which has been given before the Commisssion.
