



PDiary of the Third Manitoba Ex-

(From our own Correspondent.) Saturday, Oct. 5th.—This morning Reveille did not sound till 9 o'clock, and on parading after breakfast, we were informed we should have a rest until night, so most of us started fer an Indian encampmenty near, where we bought some fish and amused ourselves by criticising the interior of the wigwams, which are usually full of women, children, dogs and fish benes. The accuracy of the aim of the young Indians with their bows and arrows is wonderful—several of us put coppers on the end of sticks stuck in the ground, and they seldem missed striking the copper without touching the stick. At night we were told off in three detachments; the first, comprising the artillery and about 20 of our men, embarked in seven large open boats, towed by a most peculiar leoking little tug of about eight horse-After seeing them off and feeling ibetter spirits than on the previous night, we assembled round an immense camp fire belonof ing to the Indians, being a cold night we made them understand we should like to see their was dance, whereupon they commenced, at first jumping slowly round the fire beating time on an old tin kettle and singing in a low menotenous tene, suddenly breaking into a loud yell, when they brandished their knives and temahawks, jumping furiously round the fire. Our felfews soon joined in with them and a more ludicrous sight was never seen -red coats and red skins all appearing as though they had suddenly taken leave of their senses. After "lights out" had sounded, two or three wags arrayed themselves in blanket and stuck feathers in their hair imitating the Indians, and sallied forth to make an attack
