She is evidently aware of possessing all the elements of a great people, and she is pressing forward the the development of those elements. She has extended her dominions from ocean to ocean and is on the eve of extreme limits of the country. Her industries are fostered and extended. Since the withdrawal of her troops she has established a very large and efficient military ferce. What more could Canada do if she were absolutely as well as practically independent? She could do no more, and she might de much less; for, being still a poor alleged evil of Canadian reliance on the posed condition of the French Canadians is as insulting to the intelligence of Englishmen as it is to the French Canadians. There are no such signs. Because we undertake for our own reasons to square up outstanding questions with America, and doing so mismanage and injure both our own and Canadian interests, that is a sign of our faulty Government and diplomacy, and in no way of any defect in the political position and organization of Canada. Canada has nothing to do with the fiasco the culmination of which led the Times peevishly to say to her, "If you do not like our management, try to manage for yourselves." But so far as Canada was concerned there was no more reason why she should have been bidden to go this year than there was the year before, or the year before that. We are far from asserting that at some time it will not be to the advantage of Canada


