It is time that they should prove themselves aiders and not hinderers of the work they have undertaken. They must abandon the policy of past years. and awaken to the fact that the country is now determined to have an efficient immigration system in order the more speedily to fill up the waste places of the country."

Undoubtedly the country is determined to have an efficient immigration system but in Ontario the people are inclined to depend almost altogether on the Provincial government.
