It is too bad that a Tory government  
should overlook its alleged organs and  
molded over journalists' supporters, and  
should select the special correspondent of  
the Globe to whisper in his ear the precise  
date of the approaching elections. Yet,  
if we are to believe the voracious journal-  
ists mentioned, that is just what has been  
done; for it announces as follows:

"Halifax, Jan. 5.—A private despatch  
received here to-day from Ottawa states  
that the general elections are to take  
place on February 5th."

It is true that the 26th of January was  
also positively announced for the great  
event, but b-h statements obviously can-  
not be true. But the Quebec correspond-  
ent of the Globe gives still another date,  
"about the 20th of February." Really  
this is very perplexing and annoying.

We wish the organ would settle down on  
some day and let us know, instead of  
sufficing about from day to day.

**REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.**

The statements for the first six months of  
the official year, of dominion revenue and  
expenditure is exceedingly gratifying  
there being a considerable increase in the  
former and reduction in the latter as  
compared with the corresponding period  
of last year. The figures for December  
are as follows: Customs, \$1,756,946;  
excise, \$667,130; other sources, \$523,914  
making a total of \$2,847,990, as compared  
with \$2,302,630 for December 1885,  
or an increase of over half a million,  
chiefly from customs and excise. The  
expenditure is also relatively very satisfac-  
tory it being \$548,924 less than that for  
the previous December. For the first  
six months of the fiscal year, the figures  
are as follows:

Revenue ..... \$17,027,898  
Expenditure ..... 16,479,974  
Surplus ..... 547,924

For the same period last year the  
figures were:

Revenue ..... \$14,755,705  
Expenditure ..... 17,074,034  
Deficit ..... 2,318,329

In other words the revenue has increased  
by about two and a quarter mil-  
lions and the expenditure decreased by  
over two millions, the effect being to  
meet a deficit in 1885 of \$2,810,349, into  
a surplus for 1886 of \$1,647,584. The  
prospects are, therefore, most encouraging  
that on the 30th of June next there  
will be a handsome surplus once more to  
the credit of the country, as has been the  
general rule, with rare exceptions, under  
a conservative government. These figures  
will not be agreeable reading for grit  
croakers and prophets of evil, like the  
mixer and muddler of figures.

**ANTI-PROVINCIAL LEGISLATION.**

The Toronto *World* allows itself to be  
guiled by the howling of grit oracles into  
the belief that Mr. Meredith stands upon  
an anti provincial platform. The delusion  
is so transparent as to do little credit  
to the penetration of our weekly contem-  
porary. Mr. Mowat has made much  
capital by his pretension of being the  
defender of provincial rights against the  
intrusion of the dominion authorities,  
but a more flimsy and dishonest piece of  
charlatany than this boasting could not  
be imagined.

Why should the dominion government  
desire to encroach upon the rights of  
Ontario or of any other province? To do  
any real injury to a province is to invite  
the hostility of its people, a result not  
desired by any government. When did  
the administration at Ottawa show hos-  
tility to Ontario? Not during John Sandfield  
Macdonald's time, it is admitted. But  
according to grit authorities Sir John  
concerned his attacks when he found a  
strong grit government in power in To-  
ronto. One of the examples quoted in proof  
of this alleged aggression may be cited to  
show the complete hypocrisy of those who  
make the charge. Take the disallowance  
of local legislation by the federal auth-  
orities. During Mr. Mackenzie's lease of  
power his ministers of justice disallowed  
eighteen provincial acts in five years.  
Now they seem to call for intervention, the  
Ontario grits raised their voices in vehement  
denunciation of his tyranny. The truth  
is that Sir John disallowed fewer acts in  
the same number of years than Mr. Mac-  
donald.

It is not plain that the whole outcry is  
dishonest! If otherwise, why were not  
Mr. Blake and Mr. Mackenzie attacked  
as enemies of provincial rights?

**STEALING OUR TIMBER.**

that in 1874 the reform government in  
power at both Toronto and Ottawa entered  
into an agreement for the adminis-  
tration of the territory in dispute between  
them. This was signed by Mr. Laird  
and Mr. Pardes. It was provided that  
licences to cut timber should be granted  
under proper conditions, and that the  
money received under them should be  
paid to the power eventually found to be  
entitled thereto.

Since 1874 there have over three  
hundred applications for limits (under this  
agreement) to the dominion government.  
One hundred and fifteen orders-in-council  
have been passed conceding the requests  
of applicants. Only six leases, however,  
were granted for twenty-one years each,  
since the parties who obtained orders-in-  
council found the conditions so stringent  
that all but the six abandoned their  
claims. Many of these parties paid dues  
and made surveys, but obtained nothing  
in return. There were some sixty-three  
permits to settlers, and to railway  
companies requiring ties, but these were  
mostly yearly, and not one was renewed  
by the dominion government after the  
settlement of the boundary dispute.

Such is the truth of the cry that Sir  
John is being robbed of her wealth by Sir  
John.
