Sir John Macdonald arrived at Ottawa from Toronto this morning.

A young lawyer, T. J. Casarinas, was hanged at 12:30 to day at Richmond, Va.

Bismarck and Von Moltke both received cables from Germany in Utah territory congratulating them upon their speeches in the Reichstag in favor of the army bill.

The traffic returns of the Grand Trunk railway last week were: Passenger train earnings \$97,929; freight earnings \$1,944,242.

A large number of unemployed workmen held a meeting at Norwich today, after listening to the speeches of two socialists.

COMMENT ON THE DEATH OF LORD IDELSLEIGH.

London, January 14.—Lord Salisbury's rather cavalier treatment of the late foreign secretary has had consequences far more dramatic than could possibly have been foreseen.

Washington, January 14.—The anti-morison bill, as it passed the house by the adoption of the Tucker institute for Edmund's senate bill, makes the lawful husband or wife of any person prosecuted for bigamy, bigamy or unlawful cohabitation, a competent witness against the accused, and further provides for the registration of all marriages.

Winnipeg, Jan. 14.—Howard T. Blackstone, the defaulting bank clerk of the Canal national bank, Portland, Maine, who fled in November, after defrauding the bank of \$76,000, was arrested here on Wednesday afternoon.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 14.—The Journal de St. Petersburg says it is gratified at the reply given to the Bulgarian deputations by M. Goblet, prime minister of France.

Berlin, Jan. 14.—The fate of the army bill was settled by the Reichstag adversely to the government and action was immediately taken to dissolve the chamber.

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Two men at Ponce de Leon, Fla., from Buenos Ayres report that cholera has broken out there.

The knif fight at Canajoharie, N. Y., has been declared off by the general executive board of the knights of labor.

A Toronto correspondent hints that a new conservative paper, to be called the Star, is to appear in Toronto about February 1st.

At a meeting of the retail grocers' association of Montreal it was decided to apply at the next session of the provincial legislature for an act of incorporation.

The New York Times says the cable pool will make a bitter legal fight to prevent the French cable company from carrying on its purpose of withdrawing from the pool.
