The Descent on the Tam O'shanter Sild Said to be Made at the Rate of Seventy Miles an Hour,

Oil water color paints in boxes at prices never before heard of in Kingston, at The Tam O Shanter toboggan slide is claimed to be the fastest in Ontario, but up to the present the exact velocity has not been ascertained. Experts have said that the descent is made at the rate of seventy miles an hour. Regarding fast time the following will prove interesting :-- By careful timing, it has been ascertained that toboggans attain a velocity of 90 miles an hour on the Albany, N Y. slide. It would look ever so much bigger appointment. He was nominated by Mr. to say that they attain the velocity of Williams. to say that they attain the velocity of 2.160 miles aday, 15,120 a week, or 60, 480 a lunar month, or 788,400 miles a year. Think of travelling three-quarters of a million miles in one year, and then reflect on the speed of the toboggan. The Saratoga slide is over 3,000 feet in length, but many of the toboggans run a distance of 3,500 feet. The initial drop is 118 feet in 370 of length, giving a speed that enables a toboggan to run the first 1,700 feet of the slide in 25 seconds.
