METHODIST MISSIONS, The Annual Meeting in the First Methodist Church last night—Several Good Addresses.

The attendance at the missionary meeting in the first Methodist church last evening was not large.

The speaker was the Rev. James Allan, of Brockville, W. E. Dawson, of Verona, W. Mavety and Dr. Grant.

The speaker then read the report of the Rev. J. W. Sparling to read the annual report which was to the effect that the revenue for the missionary cause from the whole Methodist church last year was \$120,000.
