-The Report Read and Adopted. The annual meeting of the house of industry was held in the police court chamber yesterday afternoon. Those An Allusion to Louis Riel- What a Certain present were Col. Superintendent Harkiss' report read as follows: Seventy four persons were admitted to the institution during the year, and on the 1st of February 49 were remaining. THE CONDITION OF THE INDIANS AT PRESENT.

Portion of the Press Like to See Indian Crucities-Better Times for the Red Men.

missions, Manitoba, and much was said, in his very clear and impressive manner, regarding the Indian tribes, their past, present and future, which is of deep interest to Canadians at the present time. He showed the Indian in his n tive or Pagan state, and also when brought to a condition of civilization through the influence of the Christian mission work. He demonstrated very clearly that the tribes in the North-West are not only capable of civilization, but also capable in the near future, with a little previous instruction, of maintaining themselves, and thus cease to be a burden upon the government. The total number of Indians between the north shore of Lake Superior and the Rocky mountains was stated to be about 60,000, of which about forty pencent, were claimed to be Christians, or under the influence of Christianity. Not many years ago the buffalo roamed these vast North West prairies in large numbers, the product of this animal, viz, its meat and skin, furnishing an abundance of food, clothing, and material for the erection of tents; in fact, everything required for the physical comfort and well being of the Indian. But in late years the buffalo has become extinct, having been slaughtered by tens of thousands, and suddenly the poor Indian finds himself face to face with starvation.
