THE SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

Ottawa Thinks It Has a Better Right to It

Than Kingston, An Ottawa despatch says that there is likely to be a conflict of interests between Kingston and Ottawa as to the desired establishment of the school of practical science for eastern Ontario. Mr. Mowat, in his answer to the Kingston deputation, intimated that Ottawa might lay claim to assistance for such a project. This is explained by an interview in the Journal with Principal McCabe of the Ottawa normal school, who says that when he heard of the Kingston project he thought it his duty to at once ask the Ontario government that the school should be established at Ottawa in connection with the Normal school for the following reasons: That the normal school being a government institu tion already well equipped for practical science work would save the expense of endowing another institution; also that the fact of the geological museum being situated in Ottaws, in which are stored the best specimens of mineral from Toronto and other deposits from all over Canada, would not necessitate the establishment of a museum in connection with the school. Then again, the O tawa valley is acknowledged to be the richest place in the province in mineral deposits, which is another great advantage Kingston does not possess. Principal McCabe's idea will probably be vigorously pushed here.
