THE VERY LATEST NEWS

CAUGHT FROM THE WIRES AND CONDENSED FOR BUSY READERS.

Major McKay, one of the conservative candidates in Hamilton, has sued the *Times* of that city for \$10,000 damages for libel.

James Morrison, an election judge committed for fraud, died in the Scranton, Pa., jail on Tuesday of delirium tremens.

James Russell Lowell delivered an address on "American politics" in Chicago, on Tuesday night, to a crowded audience.

Anne Barrett, one of the Barrett sisters, trapéze performers, fell from the roof of a Baltimore theatre, on Tuesday, 50 feet, and was seriously hurt.

The Philadelphia market and points further south are flooded with antrachite coal to such an extent that orders for a large amount of it are being countermanded.

Mars J. E. Woodley & Co., manufacturers of boots and shoes in Quebec, have suspended payment with liabilities of \$40,000, due to wholesale leather firms in Montreal and in Quebec.

Mr. Chamberlain has drawn up a scheme to settle the Irish question on the Canadian federation plan. It is expected Mr. Gladstone will summon the whole liberal party to consider the matter.

Three more arrests have been made in Quebec at the instance of Mayor Lange for circulating a criminal libel. The names of those arrested are Ferdinand Delisle, John Bussiere, grocer, and James Papillon, blacksmith.

The annual dinner of the southern society of New York was given at Hotel Brunswick, on Tuesday night, and was attended largely. Hon. Algernon S. Sullivan presided. Gen. Ewing made the principal speech.

Arrests in connection with the recently discovered military plot continue at St. Petersburg and elsewhere in the interior. The object of the conspirators was to create discontent in the army and navy over the peace policy of the government.

Right Hon. W. H. Smith's motion for closure provides that a motion for closure cannot be made by a member without the sanction of the speaker having been previously obtained, and that such motions must be supported by two hundred members.

There was an animated scene at the Nice festivities on Monday on the occasion of the battle of flowers. The prince of Wales and his son, Prince George, were bombarded with bouquets. A host of aristocrats took part in the festivities.

The *Journal de St. Petersburg* denies that Russia had imposed the settlement of the Bulgarian difficulty and says: "The British press book shows who is responsible for the original disturbance in Bulgaria. The English press should seek the cause elsewhere than in Russia."

Tuesday, Frederick Fries, was at work on a large ice cake frozen to the wheel pit of the Rochester electric light company's works at what is known as the upper falls. The cake became detached and fell into the river, carrying Fries with it.

The funeral of Mrs. Friendship, from her late residence Division street, took place this afternoon and was very largely attended, testifying to the respect in which the deceased was held. The Rev. Dr. Hooper had served at the house before the funeral procession started.

The journalistic fest of the day in Toronto is the election number of *Globe* issued this morning. It contains double page cartoons in color showing the triumph of the winning party. It was issued five hours after the result was made known.

The register-general has issued his report on the births, deaths and marriages registered in England and Wales in the year 1885. The births and deaths registered in the year numbered respectively 804,670 and 522,750. The natural increase, therefore, is equal to 1.36 per cent of the population.

The suit of Mr. Andrew Allan against the Montreal gas company was decided upon its merits by Mr. Justice Papineau. It was taken by plaintiff for the recovery of \$1,300 damages on the ground that through a defect in the pipes laid on Peel street by the gas company the flowers in plaintiff's conservatories suffered to a considerable extent. The company met the action by a general denial, and the court yesterday dismissed the action for want of proof.

A LAMENTED DEATH.

Bemise of the Mother Superior of the Hotel Dieu.

Last evening at a quarter to ten o'clock there departed this life, Sister Jane Lahey, the mother superior of the Hotel Dieu. Deceased was born on Brock street on the eleventh of July, 1831. In the month of September, 1852, she was placed in the Hotel Dieu by her uncle, Mr. A. Murphy, of Trenton. During the 34 years she has been engaged in the work of administering to the wants of the poor and sick, she has endeared herself in the hearts of all with whom she has come in contact. Her life has been such as to command the admiration and respect of all the sisters of charity. Seven weeks ago she took sick, and from the first day that she became ill a feeling that she was not going to recover took possession of her and she gradually grew worse until death claimed her last night. Her funeral will take place on Friday, but at what hour has not been stated. High mass will be celebrated in the chapel in the institution to-morrow, the 24th, at 10 a.m.

Fridays, Sister Lahey held the office of mother superior on two occasions. During the time she has been in the institution she has held nearly every office in the hospital and apothecary. She was one of the first boarders in the Congregatio de Notre Dame. To-morrow her remains will be exposed in the chapel so that friends may view them. She was an energetic superior and will be greatly missed by the poor and sick.
