

NEWFOUNDLAND'S RIGHTS

Firmly Instated Fpon in the Legislature's address to the Quren.

St. John's, N.B., March -1st -- A universal state of gloom prevails here, and there is a general feeling that any change is better than the present state of affaire. The press people and legislature speak out in unmistakable terms. England is plainly told that the disallowance of the bait bill at the request of the French government was a most humilating act, and that the colony having been abandoned by Great Britain must look elsewhere for a protector. Newfoundland will not put up with England's treatment any longer, and will seek either annexation to the United States or confederation with Canada.
