TEETOTAL TEXT BOOKS. Protest Against their Use from the No tional Liberal Temperance Union. Mr. Goldwin Smith, Mr. A. J. Cattanach Mr. J. Gordon Mowat, Prof. Richardson, Dr. T. F. McMahon and Mr. Robt. Gilray repre sented the Executive Committee of the N tional Liberal Temperance Union in a deputation to the Ontario Government yesterday after M.P.P. introduced the gentlemen to Mr. John Leys, Toronto's Reform Attorney General and the Minister of Education, who represented the Government. Sev. eral members of the Legislature listened

The deputation had two principal gries nuces : the use of total abstinence text book in the schools, and the appointment of wpecial Mr. Goldwin Smith spoke on the first point, He contended that nothing but recognized and universally admitted truth should have a place in text books. Without arguing the question as to whether or not the use of wine and secretary. beer was criminal, Mr. Smith said its use was not universally recognized as such. Total abstinence was in the position, not of a recognized truth, but of a party dogma. To a great many Christians, total abstinence conflicted with the teaching of the New Testament.
