At any time during a debate a member may move that "the question be now mitted without amendment or debate. If there are more than two hundred members present there must be at least two hundred votes in its favor or it is lost. When there are not two hundred members present there must be less than forty against the cloture and more than one hundred in its favor or the motion is declared lost. As soon as the motion for closing the debate passes, the discussion is brought to an end and the main question is put.
