There is no excitement across the board, and immediately Ald. Thompson, who acted as premier for the 'lefties' in the absence of Alds. Hartly and Gidderidge, began to count noses. Ald. Mc'Intyre then moved, seconded by Ald. C. Robinson, that the council go into committee of the whole to discuss the by-law providing for the appointment of three assessors.

Ald. C. Robinson—I won't second that motion.

Ald. Thompson, in answer to Ald. Mc'Intyre, said he did not know how he would vote on the question yet, but as there were several aldermen absent he would like the matter left over.

Ald. Mc'Intyre—That was the difficulty last year you did not know how you were going to vote.

Ald. Thompson said he could not vote for the motion, when Ald. Mc'Intyre referred to what had occurred last year.

Ald. Robinson—I will vote for three assessors, but I don't want you to secure a catch vote.

Ald. Mc'Intyre—You want the question carried and then again you don't. Perhaps Ald. Snowden will second the motion.

THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

The council then went into committee of the whole, Ald. Downing in the chair. Ald. Thompson moved that the master of the numerus complaints regarding the assessment which had been made, more particularly by residents of Rideau Ward, but for some reason or other, when the matter was raised at the council adjourned, and it was fully four or five months before he got the by-law definitely before the council.
