It is well known that but for this power of dealing in personam with a stubbern or dishonest debtor it would be quite useless to endeavour to collect a debt at all from many persons. The law as it at present obtained judgment to summon the defendant and have him examined upon oath touching his means of paying. If on his own showing the judge is estisfied that the debtor is able to gay the debt in instalments he makes an order to that effect as small amounts as one dollar a month occasionally being ordered. If the defendant neglects to pay as directed he can be summoned again to give any reasons which he may have for not obeying the order. If he is unable to give any reasonable excuse, then the judge has power to order him to be im prisoned usually for ten days, or other short period, in the jail. 
