Thirty-Three Knights of Labor Quit Work

Gananoque Journal. employ of Skinner & Co., left work, and have not since returned. On being inter viewed, Mr. Skinner said that he was notified before three o'clock on that day that if he did not discharge a man named Mailory before three o'clock the men would leave, and as he refused to do this, the men left. Mr. Skinner says representatives of the kwights of labor met him and said they wanted the man discharged because he did not belong to their order and refused to join it. The man as soon as informed of the trouble Wilson will take place to morrow after- left the shop, stating that he did not want to be the cause of trouble, but although he left the other men still remained out having no other grievance that Mr. Skinner is aware of. This is Mr. Skinner's bare statement of the reason for the strike.

When asked to give any particulars he was at liberty to make public, regardingthe strike Mr. George Toner, the chief of the knights of labor here, told a reporter that the trouble at Skinner's factory was not a question of wages, or long or short hours, but was one of safety to the employees, and that all they demanded was that a competent person should be put in charge of the boiler, the person who had been in charge not being in their estimation competent to discharge the duty. Mr. Toner said the matter was in the hands of the knights of labor, and the order was that the men should remain out until Mr. Skinner put the boiler into the hands of a person agreeable to them. Mr. Skinner contends that the boiler is perfectly safe and has always had proper attention. Of the thirty six men standing out thirty-three belong to the krights of labor, and draw pay from the order

every day they remain cut. Mr. Skinner says he does not feel like being dictated to as to whom he shall or shall not employ, and the men are equally firm in the determination to have only a man to perform the special work alluded to of their own choosing or one they consider competent, and thus the matter

stands at present.
