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

GEN. BOULANGER, FRENCH, MINIS-TER OF WAR, AND HIS CRITICS.

Never was a Frenchman so lampooned as Boulanger. He has no reverence for millionaires. The sons of cosmopolitan bankers are subject to military service just as if they belonged to the proletariat. He is, however, merciful to the medical profession. Medical students are exempted from three years' service in the ranks. War talk in Europe turns attention to

horses. Every government looks to its supply of horses-necessary animals when men go out to kill each other. Germany took the alarm first and issued an edict that no more horses should be exported. Russia soon did the same, and so did Austria. France imports instead of exports horseflesh. She bought 3,000 from Denmark, an incident which opened the eyes of Gernjany. The number of horses required for military purposes even in time of peace is enormous; and when two European armies are on a war footing the number of horses required is astonishing. Poor little Belgium in peace has need of 10,000 horses for her army. In war Germany wants \$96,000 and France \$75,000; Austria demands 202,000, and Russia exceeds



It is said that England is more destitute of avairy and artillery horses than any of the great powers. There are only 2,000,000 horses in Great Britain, and nearly all of these are draft, hunting and race horses, so that no other country can buy army horses there Russia has more horses than any country in the world-over 23,000,000; but, since export is forbidden, Europe can only look to the United States or Canada for its supplies, both of which have only 13,000,000,

No European army employs mules except the armies of Spain and Portugal, where they are used almost exclusively for the commissariat service. Italy and Switzerland have a small number of mountain batteries horsed by mules. England took on a stock of mules from America for her commissariat service when there was talk of war with Russia; but they did not satisfy the bold British heart, wedded through the ages to horses, and they were sold at auction at less than one-fourth

France has the science of war all in her hand. It has not been long since the French government commission reported that within ten hours after the declaration of hostilities it would be possible to concentrate 40,000 men on any given point, and that administrative and railway arrangements would enable troops to refrch the same spot at the rate of 18,000 an hour for the ensuing twenty-four hours, at the end of which time 472,000 men could be put in line. France has eighteen army corps, . The total force with which France would begin operations is 1,049,800 nen, with 2,725 guns. The cuts accompanying this show how Boulanger exercises his soldiers how he is preparing them for the possible impending struggle with Germany.
