A Curious Legal Suit.

New Haven, Conn., April 22.—George H. Ford, proprietor of a fashionable jewelry establishment here, has brought suit for \$10,000 for libel against the New Haven Union. Ford was on the invitation committee appointed in connection with the proposed unveiling of a soldiers' monument here in June. He and a local artist designed and executed a gorgeous invitation to President and Mrs. Cleveland to attend the ceremonies and placed it on exhibition in the window of his store. While it was thus displayed, it was discovered that the Union called attention to it through its columns. The gentleman in charge of the arrangements for the day had another invitation prepared, which read more correctly, and which was recently tendered to Mr. Cleveland. Ford claims that the Union has held him up for "ridicule" and contempt.

An Infernal Machine.

Cleveland, April 22.—A special from Kent, Ohio, tells of a diabolical attempt to kill Professor Thomas Sandford of the place with an infernal machine. A bomb box was left in the hallway of his residence. It was peculiarly constructed, with a knot at one end with which to open a small drawer. Being suspicious, Prof. Sandford shook the box and a few grains of gunpowder fell out. Upon closer examination he discovered several matches, so arranged as to be ignited when the drawer was opened. He threw the box into the door yard, when an explosion occurred, which shattered the windows of an adjacent house. There is no known motive for the attempted murder.

Murderous Cowboys.

Albuquerque, N.M., April 22.—Deaths reached here this morning of a brutal murderer at Seven Rivers, 80 miles south west of this place. Finney and Eddy, two cowboys, went into the town to spend a month's lay, and in a short time were drunk. They commenced firing bullets in the saloon, when D. H. Beldett, well known and popular ranch man took the cattle away, but returned them when assured they had done damage should be done. After more drinking, however, the cowboys thought themselves received an insult at the hands of Beldett, and hunting him up, picked a quarrel with him, finally shooting him through the heart. Beldett was unarmed. The cowboys escaped.

AT THE CAPITAL
Curtain's Motion on Home Rule in the House of Commons.

Ottawa, April 22.—In the House of Commons yesterday the following resolution by Mr. Curran was discussed from 3:30 p.m. till 11:30 last night. The debate will be continued to-day:

That this House desires to repeat the expression of sympathy and support given by the people of Ireland to the cause of Home Rule, and to urge upon the Government to take such steps as may be necessary to secure the adoption of the bill for the suspension of the powers of the Crown in Ireland, now before the Imperial Parliament, in accordance with the representations made on it which it needs.

The speakers were Mr. Curran, Mr. McNeil of North Bruce, Mr. Kerney of Halifax, Mr. Flynn of Richmond, Mr. Brien of Muskoka, and others.

BODILY AND OTHER EVENTS AT THE CAPITAL

Ottawa, April 21.—The Government have represented to the Imperial Government the necessity of taking steps to protect the rights and liberties of British subjects in the waters of Bering's Sea, and the papers will be brought down in a few days.

A delegation of Montreal storemen waited upon the Minister of Finance to-day and opposed any change being made in the duty on iron. The interference with trade was unavoidable. He declared that the bankruptcy clauses of the bill would determine the Irish people. Earl Carnarvon supported the bill, and said, in the interests of the landlords, the bankruptcy clause ought to be removed.

Baron Fitzgerald condemned the bill as too complicated to work with ease and safety.

Lord Ashbourne said the bill, if passed, would prove a great check to evictions.

OPEN FOR ENGAGEMENTS.

LONDON, April 21.—The news this morning says Major Saunderson has allowed it to be known that he will be at home during certain hours of the day should any one desire to communicate with him in a hostile spirit in respect to the accusations by him against members of the National League.

ANTRY TO DEFLATE COMBINATION.

LONDON, April 21.—Gladstone writes that he does not desire a general strike to parliament until the English mind is ripe on the Irish question as the Welsh and Scotch minds are, but that time is rapidly advancing. "Anyhow," he says, "I am prepared to face anything to defeat coercion." I continue to hope for much from vigorous action on the part of the constituents whose representatives in parliament have the decisive votes of extinction.

ROW AT A LADIES' MEETING.

LONDON, April 22.—At a meeting of the ladies' liberal association at Kensington last evening, at which several members of parliament were present, a row arose on the Irish question. Finally the platform was stormed and a free fight ensued in which the furniture in the hall was smashed and the pieces used as weapons.

The police succeeded in restoring order after a hard struggle, making several arrests.

LONDON, April 22.—The Times reports that the arrest of E. E. Shappard was made by Judge Danvers of Montreal. He contends that Mr. Sheppard, having already been punished for the offence, cannot be tried again for the same offence.

A WOMAN, WHITE AWAITING A DIVORCE, DIES.

Married Twice.

KINGSTON, N.Y., April 21.—The case was tried the other day, before Judge Verker, that involves the marriage laws of England, Canada and the United States. In 1876 Annie Tower, an English lady, married one Tate in Yorkshire, England, and in 1878 entered an action for divorce on the ground of adultery. On May 1, 1878, the court ordered that the marriage be set aside, and the plaintiff should be shown within six months from the date of the order. Before the expiration of the date she went to the States and married one Stewart, one Stewart, her former marriage was not registered. In January, 1880, Mrs. Stewart lived with her for two years, and hearing of the English suit of divorce the two separated.
