

THE VERY LATEST NEWS. CAUGHT FROM THE WIRES AND CONDENSED FOR BUSY READERS.

The affairs of the North Atlantic steamship company have been ordered to be wound up. H. T. Buckingham, treasurer of the Canadian Pacific and society, has been arrested at Winnipeg for embezzlement. Captain Thomas Howard has been elected president of the society formed by the survivors of the Red river expedition. Gieseler, the alleged accomplice of Francis in the murder of Miss Keegan, her maid and the latter's daughter, has been arrested in Paris, but he has established his innocence. Mayor Howard, of Toronto, interviewed the minister of justice yesterday with the object of obtaining amendments to the Criminal Code to make it more stringent. Mr. Norquy's bill empowering the Manitoba government to build a railway to the boundary provides for the issue of one million dollars of provincial bonds for its construction. Mr. Kilbride, one of the tenants who were evicted from Lord Lansdowne's estates, and who will accompany Mr. O'Brien, editor of United Ireland, on his tour of Canada, has started for Queenstown, where he will meet Mr. O'Brien. The latter will leave London to-night for Quebec. John Bright, advocating a continuance of free trade in England, has written a letter in which he says that the reason other nations maintain high tariffs is that those who are protected are an organized army while the unprotected are merely a mob. The United States, under a system of protection, are burdened with a large surplus revenue yet refuse to lessen duties, thus promoting a system of corruption unequalled in any other country. The air has abandoned his intention of staying several weeks in St. Remond and has returned to Gatineau. Mr. Balfour, chief secretary for Ireland, in a speech at Ipswich last night said he was surprised at Gladstone's statement that he had never approved the participation in crime.

London, April 23.—The French government has asserted that Schaubel was arrested on German soil. The reports of the German police are to the same effect. Numerous extra detectives have been sent to Metz and Strasbourg.
