The Irish Resolutions Carried by a Vote of 39 to 28 in the Assembly, Tosovro, April 23.

The Home sat all night debating the Irish resolutions introduced by the Attorney General. At 4 o'clock this morning they ere carried 54 to 29. The resolutions are as

That the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, repre-senting upwards of two millions of Her Majesty's, Canadian subjects, feel deep interest in all that con-corns the well-being of every part of the British Em-pire, of which we rejoice that our province forms That the people of this province are chiefly, though not wholly, of British birth or urigin: that a consider frishmen, and live in the utmost harmony with their fellow-subjects of ever nationality, sharing in the general prosperity which the province enjoys under a constitution granted by the Imperial Parliament at the reguest of the Canadian people, and securing all the local self-government which at the time was desired.

That we regard with the deepest sorrow the distress and discontent which have long prevailed in Ireland, and which present a marked contrast with the prosperity and contentment of the Irish people in this province and elsewhere.

That, alive from our own experience to the disadvantages of Home Rule, we halled with joy the introduction last year into the British House of Common of a measure which recognized the principle of local self-government for Ireland, and we hoped that the Bill, with such improvements in details as discussion should suggest and the wisdom of Parliament device, might afford in settlement of long existing difficulties, and promote the unity, happiness and prosperity of the Empire.
