INTERVIEWING THE GOVERNMENT ABOUT THE DRY DOCK

The scheme May be Successful-A Publi Op'nion Secured-What Sir John and His Colleagues Sald.

Ald. Gildersleeve and Muckleston, who went to Ottawa with the deputation on Tuesday, returned to the city last night and report that their visit to the capital was pleasant and profitable. The other members of the deputation will not return until this eyening. Yesterday morning the deputation, accompanied by Mr. Ward, M.P., of Durham, and Mr. Wilson M P., of Napanee, waited on the Hon Mr. Thompson, minister of justice, and the first speaker was Ald. McIntyre, who explained that, owing to the lock department in the penitentiary having been shut down, there were a number of con victs out of employment. As the marine interest had for a long time complained about the want of dry dock accommodation at the east end of lake Ontario, it was proposed to endeavor to secure the service of the idle convicts erecting a dry dock. The council and board of trade, therefore, appointed a deputation to ask the government to furnish a number of the convicts alluded to for the purpose named. Circumstances Secure your's in time. City Hall, May prevented the work from being done by free labor, but if the dock were construct ed by convicts, work would afterwards be provided for a large number of men in this locality and the marine interests would be benefited The speaker also referred to the grand jury's report in which regret was expressed that convicts would soon be idle, and consequently

> Captain Gaskin also addressed the minister showing the large interest involved in the matter, and giving the number of vessels which he alone represented. He al uded to the sinking of the Myles and pointed out that as she could not be hauled out here she wou'd have to be taken up the lake before being repaired. He proved to the minister that a dry dock at Kingston would be a direct bene fit to the Canadian grain carrying trade. Ald. Gildersleeve spoke of the objection that might be raised against the use of convict labor, and said that he believed that both sides in politics felt that the construction of the dry dock as requested would be a legitimate means of employing

Hon, Mr. Thompson agreed with the remarks made, and said that if the min ister of public works considered that the work was advisable he would furnish 50 or 100 convicts as soon as they were re-
