UNFAIR CRITICISM: The Globe and other grit organs are very unfairly criticizing the position taken by the Dominion government in reference to the proposed temporary arrangement of the fishery question.

The matter is an important one, and the great power of the Canadian press should be used in the best way towards securing, for Canada the best possible result.

Whatever excuse or justification may be offered for hostile criticism, by opposition journals, of the majority of government measures, this is a question of such great interest to this country that it should be made an exception, and the desire to gain any political advantage by misrepresenting the government should be abandoned.

The correspondence which has taken place already is such as to satisfy any reasonable or fair-minded man that our government is very much in earnest in its determination to secure for Canada the fullest possible measure of justice.

The Globe itself has referred in highly commendatory terms to the reply made by the minister of justice to Mr. Bayard's proposals.

The whole course of the government since the termination of the Washington treaty proves beyond question that it has done everything in its power to maintain our rights, some grit journals, among them the Hamilton Times even charging that the minister of justice and fisheries was acting too strictly in his interpretation of the law.

Now, then, what is the position of affairs? Mr. Bayard having submitted his proposals for a settlement, Lord Lansdowne forwarded his objections thereto, and a perusal of these will convince any one that there was no appearance of concession exhibited.

In answer to this a telegram from Sir Henry Holland suggesting a reversion "to the condition of things existing under the treaty of Washington, the fisheries being again thrown reciprocally open, and fish and fish products being again reciprocally admitted duty free.

This arrangement, if a permanent one, is to be substituted at least for a term, as to admit of discussion of more extended commercial arrangements." To this part of the telegram the Canadian reply was that the "government would accept your suggestion of reverting temporarily to the condition of things, etc."

While it is quite true that Sir Henry Holland was willing that the proposed arrangement should be permanent he also left it open to accept it "at least for a term so as to admit of discussion," etc., and the acceptance is limited to this "temporary arrangement."

The object of our government is to secure some temporary modus vivendi pending a discussion of more extended commercial arrangements. Nothing can be clearer than that. Now what will be thought of a critic who misrepresents the arrangement as being a permanent one, and then proceeds to condemn the Canadian government for consenting to it?

What other course was open to us? The fishing season is beginning and no doubt the Gloucester pirates will renew their tactics of last year. In the absence of any such arrangement as above we must either go on and seize the pirates or else let them rob us with impunity.

In the face of the correspondence from the home authorities would any prudent government be justified in adopting either alternative? It must be remembered that we are not our own masters and we are not so strong as to justify us in recklessly breaking off negotiations and rejecting the British suggestions. Clearly the Canadian government has taken the wisest course open to it. To misrepresent that course as a permanent one is unwise and dishonest.

The question of demanding an indemnity pending the arrangement in question is also unfairly and dishonestly dealt with by certain of the opposition press. We will let the correspondence again speak for itself. Sir Henry Holland's telegram above mentioned, after making the above suggestion, continued thus: "They think, however, that it would clearly be to the interest of the Dominion to offer this arrangement without any suggestion of pecuniary indemnity."

To this Lord Lansdowne replies, after agreeing to accept the arrangement "temporarily," that his government "do not desire to raise the question of indemnity." Bearing in mind that the arrangement is to be but a temporary one it is obvious that no good object could be gained by "raising the question of indemnity" pending it.

That question once raised would be almost certain to postpone, at least, the adoption of the temporary arrangement, and delay is to be avoided. The language used shows that the Canadian government do not waive or abandon our right to indemnity when the final arrangement is being made. They do not "raise the question at all—they let that question lie—they leave that as one of the details of the final settlement. There is, therefore, no ground for the clamour of grit critics that our government has abandoned all question of indemnity, that in the language of one critic, "nothing can be plainer than that they have agreed to go back to the terms of the Washington treaty for good, and that there is to be no question hereafter of pecuniary indemnification." The expressions "for good" and "no question hereafter," evidently point to a final and permanent arrangement and permanent abandonment of indemnity, whereas it is perfectly clear

that the arrangement in both respects is temporary and may be put in end to at any time.

Newark has a sensation in the action of Mr. Doane in forbidding Miss Dunn, a celebrated soprano singer, to carry out her contract to sing in a Protestant church in that city.

This is the third time the manager has prevented her from getting a fine position in a choir, and Miss Dunn feels that she has been harshly treated, having formerly been forced to give up a position worth \$1,100 a year.

This time she was inclined to disobey the order, but was threatened with excommunication if she persisted. It seems rather hard that the young lady should be deprived of the opportunity of earning a splendid income, but it is of course a question of conscience. She can stay in the church and obey, or disobey and leave the church according as her conscience dictates.

It is proposed to transact the country's business by daylight and close the house of commons at six o'clock. The proposal is a good one, and the change desirable. The business can be done just as well by day as by night, and having a regular hour for adjournment would have a tendency to discourage unnecessary indulgence, and improve the business methods of the house.

The Hamilton Times asks: "Is monopoly a grievance?" That depends whether you belong to it or not.

Sir John's Supplies of Brains. Rumors have been in circulation for some time that Sir John Macdonald, the present Canadian premier, is to be raised to the peerage.

The rumors are supplemented now by a statement that the interesting event is to take place on the 21st of next month. His title will probably be that of Earl of Ottawa.

Knights of the Bath and baronets are becoming so common in Canada now-a-days that "Sir" is scarcely a distinction, and it is not surprising that Sir John, who stands head and shoulders above the rest for ability and has been in public service far longer, should be advanced another peg.

He has many points to recommend him for the elevation, but sufficient on that he has been as conscientiously a conscientious Tory as the present British administration of the queen could ask or desire. There is one objection, however, which Sir John Macdonald has far too many brains to be enrolled in the British peerage.

A Retired William. Toronto Telegram. William O'Brien is travelling on the belief that his matchless eloquence will win the winds that fan Lansdowne's champagne. He is a defended man. An enlightening population is busy now with the proceedings in the national parliament, its spring seeding, and the mighty issues that are being debated daily by our representatives on the green diamond.

William fancies the "patriotic hearts" are going to be fired into enthusiasm that will grow until this climate is too hot for the governor general. But he has chosen our busy day for his visit.

ASTONISHING OIL REGIONS CHRONICLE. "I see by an Ohio paper," said Grandfather Lickington, "that in a well at North Inlet, more than 1,000 feet of oil was struck at the depth of 1,000 feet. For four Ohio newspapers may imagine they have found something new, it may be well enough to remind them that this is an old thing to Pennsylvania drillers. We all remember the well on Oil Creek several years ago where a drill penetrated a lumber yard at the depth of 1,500 feet, and began at once to spray pine shingle. I was sitting on that well myself, and distinctly recall the intense excitement the strike created in lumber circles. There was a genuine panic in the board room, and prices fell off 50 per cent. in a few hours, except at the place where I boarded. We shot the well in the lumber stratum, and she responded nobly with pine and hemlock scantlings of the most desirable lengths—matched flooring, dressed and undressed, walnut and oak plank, and bath and fence pickets, until the whole darning lease was covered with them. I never saw such a sight since I used to run a double back action saw, as exact as sawmill at Sagawah. Not the least wonderful feature of the whole thing was a bundle of papers that came up one day after a shot, which proved to be a lot of legal proceedings, ending in a suit for trespass and damage. I give the Ohio people credit for having a very nice, old field, but I doubt if they will be able to show us old timers, except at the place where I boarded, in the business."—Oil City Derrick.
