The First Who Attained the Purple. Laclede, in the Montreal Gasette, writes 'J. G.," Montreal, informs me of the interesting fact that Mgr. Taschereau is not the first Canadian prelate who attained the Roman purple. My correspondent has in his possession a copy of the Atlas, paper published in New York, date 1830-31, and containing a list of the cardinals assembled at Rome to elect a suc cessor to Pope Pius VIII. Among these cardinals is one Englishman, Thomas Weld, suffragan bishop of Kingston, in Upper Canada, and coadjutor and bishop in partibus of Amyela. The Welds are a well known English family who kept the old faith, and figure frequently in ecclesiastical annals. It was they who donated to the Jesuit order the college of Stony hurst, in the north of England, where Hon. M. Turcotte, and other Canadians, received their education. Cardinal Weld was born in London, January 22nd, 1773, and called to the Sacred college on the 15th March, 1830. It is probable that like one or two of the French bishops of Quebec, he never came to Canada.
